

PRICES CHANGE RAPIDLY The Stock Market Made Feverish by London's Depression.

Brooklyn Rapid Transit and Sugar Refining Lead the Trading in Swift Advances—Declines in Local Tractions Generally Not Extensive—Anticipating the Bank Statement.

NEW YORK, April 6.—The Stock Market was exceedingly irregular in the early dealings, and the trading was marked by a good deal of feverishness. The London market was materially depressed by the news and forecasts of changes in the American quarter, although the changes for the most part were in the direction of lower prices. The strongest features of the local market in the early dealings were Brooklyn Rapid Transit and Sugar Refining, both of which advanced rapidly over one point. In the railway list, Pennsylvania opened at about yesterday's final figures, but subsequently it rose sharply. Manhattan was also notably strong, but aside from that case and Brooklyn Rapid Transit the dealings in the local traction issues were not extensive.

Most of the middle-priced stocks were dealt in at fractional recessions from yesterday's final figures. Baltimore and Ohio, common and preferred, were exceedingly active and the preferred stock again crossed the price level of the common. Among the specialties, Consolidated Gas was featured toward the close of the week. The bank statement came in for a good deal of attention and the good showing which is expected in that regard was a sustaining factor in the market.

The Stock Market this morning was stronger than it has been for some time, apparently on the expectation of a fine bank statement tomorrow. Business was broader and both exchange and public buying were heavier. One of the specialties, Sugar, People's and traction group, were pushed up rapidly by the elapses and the railway list generally advanced fractionally. The steel stocks, also were active. The market during the day was insignificant. London gold, some Americans and bought others, but was less enthusiastic than heretofore. Money was plentiful.

Sugar during the first hour started up 1/2. During the entire week the stock has been strong at times, and the remainder of the market was suffering from heavy realizing. The meaning of the movement is of course variously interpreted. Some of the most important people in the financial world are owners of the stocks of these companies and vitally interested in their management, and, as has been pointed out heretofore, it is absurd to suppose that these people are caught in the net of speculative, speculative, speculative, worthless concerns. But the earnings of the companies themselves are answer enough to those who talk heartily of the steel stocks. Federal steel companies, whether it receives dividends once a year or once a quarter, is certain to receive 5 and quite likely to receive 6 per cent a year, which, at the present time, price, would make returns of 10 or 12 per cent on the investment.
