WANT TAXES REMITTED

A Large Number of Applications From District Residents.

The Commissioners Consider Many Appeals, Including One From the Y. M. C. A. Asking for Exemption on the Ground That It is an Educational and Religious Organization.

The Commissioners have had before them recently an unusually large number of applications for the remission of taxes in various parts of the District. This morning there were no less than ten such petitions for relief from the burden of taxation in one form or another.

One of these was a request from the Young Men's Christian Association to be exempted from taxation on the ground that it is used for educational and religious purposes. The property in question is known as sublots 27, 28, 49, 50, 51, and 60 in square 139. These sublots, Mr. Tucker claims, are used by the association in its work, except a small building on part of lot numbered 28, which is rented by the association for \$30 a month, and is used by the tenant as a cafe.

The buildings occupying the other lots are all used, Mr. Tucker says, by the association for educational and religious purposes, and not for private gain. For these reasons the Commissioners are petitioned to release the property from taxation. If there is any doubt regarding the matter, Mr. Tucker asks that a hearing be granted to the association to be held before a decision is reached.

In reporting upon the case the Assessor of the District says: "The purpose and object of this association are stated to be exclusively for religious, educational, physical, and mental training, and not for private gain. While the institution deserves the support and commendation of all good citizens, it is submitted that this is not a church used exclusively for divine worship, nor is it a schoolhouse, educational, or collegiate establishment within the meaning of the law, and I have the honor to suggest in view of the fiscal policy involved, that the matter be referred to the Attorney of the District of Columbia for his opinion and that the request of the applicant for an oral hearing be granted before a decision shall be rendered."

It is understood that the Commissioners will adopt the suggestion of the Assessor in disposing of the application. Charles Early, of 615 Fourteenth Street northwest, writes to the Commissioners, enclosing tax certificates and an affidavit relating to sub-lots 28, 49, 50, 51, and 60, in square 139, which the writer says will explain themselves. Mr. Early states that he is attorney for Richard S. McCreery, the owner of the above-mentioned sub-lots, and he asks immediate attention to his application for the cancellation of the second half balance of tax for 1892, in accordance with the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 13, 1892. Urgency is claimed in reaching a decision in the case on the ground that the writer has been informed that within a short time a deed is to be issued for the transfer of the said sub-lots, they having been sold for delinquent taxes.

The Assessor being asked to consider the application, now reports to the Commissioners "that the records show that the certificates referred to, were issued January 11, 1892, to George E. Flemming, on which an erroneous amount of tax was reported to the amount of \$18.80, which should have been \$88.13, leaving a balance of \$71.33. On January 19, 1892, transfer of the land was made to Richard S. McCreery, evidently on the faith of the certificate of January 11, 1892, and as attested by the accompanying affidavit.

"This case comes within the provisions of the act of May 12, 1892, relating to the tax sales and taxes. Therefore, I recommend that the collection and recovery of the balance of the tax in question be barred to any purchaser subsequent to the issue of the certificates dated January 11, 1892, and so noted on the records of this office."

It is understood that this case also will be referred to the Attorney of the District for an opinion.

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A REPRIEVE FOR SNELL

Delay of Execution Granted by Justice Clabaugh.

Was to Have Been Hanged Next Friday for the Murder of Lizzie Welsensberger in August of Last Year. June 29 the New Date Fixed for Carrying Out the Death Sentence.

Messrs. Turner and Mitchell, counsel for Benjamin H. Snell, convicted of murder and sentenced to be hanged on Friday, today filed a motion in Criminal Court, No. 1, asking for a delay of execution for two weeks, or until June 29 next. This delay, Mr. Mitchell, speaking for the defendant, said, would be necessary in order that the accused can take advantage of his rights guaranteed under the law.

After hearing the petition of counsel, Justice Clabaugh granted a stay of execution till June 29 next.

Snell was convicted of the murder of Lizzie Welsensberger on August 5, 1899, and was sentenced by Justice Clabaugh to be hanged on May 11 last. Snell took an appeal from the judgment of the trial court to the Court of Appeals for the District. This tribunal on Thursday last affirmed the judgment of the lower court. In the meantime, however, Justice Clabaugh granted a postponement of the day of execution from May 11 to June 15. Although the Court of Appeals has announced its decision affirming the finding of the Supreme Court in the District Police Court this morning.

Ernest Dietz Fined. Ernest Dietz, colored, was fined \$5 for assault upon George Clark in the Police Court this morning.

To Serve Fifteen Days. Henry Brown, charged with assault on Amelia Harzer, was sentenced to fifteen days in jail by Judge Kimball this morning.

Committed for Incorrigibility. Clinton C. Carter, charged with incorrigibility, was committed to the Boys' Reform School this morning by Judge Kimball.

Fifteen Days for Larceny. Robert Richardson, charged with the larceny of \$5 from Thomas H. Branson, was sentenced to thirty days in jail today by Judge Kimball.

Hop Chong Avenged. Lewis Brown, in default of \$3, was sentenced to nine days in jail this morning by Judge Kimball for an alleged assault on Hop Chong, a Chinaman.

Scot to the Workhouse. John J. Becker, white, was charged with disorderly conduct in the District Police Court this morning, and was fined \$5. In default he was sent to the workhouse for 15 days.

Parsons Trial Postponed. On account of the illness of Ashley M. Gould, Assistant District Attorney, representing the Government, at noon today, further hearing in the trial of Randall Parsons was postponed until tomorrow.

A Year for Assault. John Williams was charged with assault upon Richard Gillen before Judge Kimball this morning, and was found guilty and sentenced to one year in jail.

No Damages Granted. In the suit of Hugh Harzen and his wife, Julia Harzen, against the Brightwood Railway Company, the Washington, Woodside, and Forest Glen Railway and Power Company to recover \$10,000, claimed as damages for personal injuries, alleged to have been sustained by the female plaintiff, the jury today returned a verdict for the defendants.
