

HANNA IN POOR HEALTH

Senator's Friends Worried Over His Physical Condition.

Said to be Suffering From Heart Disease and Depressed Over the Failure of Campaign Arrangements.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—An evening paper prints the following:

"Senator Mark Hanna's physical condition worries his friends, rumor has it. He is said to be suffering from heart disease and is depressed by the failure of many campaign arrangements.

"The Chairman of the Republican National Committee is at his desk every day, but he is not able to give his vigorous attention to the work that has been so marked in the past. He was compelled yesterday to give up work for several hours, although engagements were pressing.

"It was said today by one of the National Chairman's intimate campaign associates that no one would be surprised if Mr. Hanna were compelled to give up the active direction of the campaign and seek complete rest."

ABANDONS THE FIGHT.

Judge Snodgrass Withdraws From the Senatorial Contest.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Aug. 15.—Judge O. L. Snodgrass has withdrawn from the race for United States Senator. He gave out a signed statement last night in which he formally announced his withdrawal.

After the Kansas City Convention, although he accepted the platform, Judge Snodgrass found that he was not in line with the views of the majority of Tennessee Democrats on the Philippine question, while his opponent, Representative Carmack has been a radical anti-expansionist.

Governor McMillin withdrew from the race some time ago, and this leaves a clear field to Representative Carmack, who will undoubtedly be elected.

SYDNEY J. BOWIE NOMINATED.

May Succeed Mr. Aldrich as a Representative From Alabama.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 15.—Sydney J. Bowie, of Talladega, was placed in nomination for Congress by the Democrats of the Fourth district yesterday. There were three candidates placed in nomination, but two were withdrawn before the first ballot was taken, and Bowie was nominated by acclamation.

ALTDIED TO BE HEARD.

Illinois' ex-Governor Will Make Campaign Speeches in German.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 15.—The announcement has been made from Democratic headquarters that ex-Governor Altgeld, of Illinois, will make a number of speeches in Indiana during the coming campaign, and that his addresses will be delivered in the German language and addressed solely to those citizens.

AN ORPHAN BOY'S SEARCH.

Worked His Way Across Country to Find an Uncle.

PRINCETON, N. J., Aug. 15.—Harry Schaffer, an orphan boy, seven-and-a-half years old, but who looks more like a lad of fifteen, has arrived at Princeton from Indianapolis, Ind., whence he set out a year ago to find his uncle, Charles Schaffer, supposed to be living in New York.

"The boy tells a very interesting story of his trip. He says his mother died when he was four years old, and that his father, Fred Schaffer, supported him, but after his death, two years ago, young Schaffer was compelled to gain his own livelihood. After working in Indianapolis a year, where he had friends, he started for New York, hoping to find his uncle. He states that he worked his way by seeking employment in various cities along the way, the last before he arrived at Princeton being Wilmington, Del. George L. Rogers, a Princeton painter, who is now repairing ex-President Cleveland's house, has taken the boy into his home, and the lad who left the city of ex-President Harrison is now working on ex-President Cleveland's residence here in Princeton. Mr. Rogers will try to get him in communication with his uncle."

MARKET OPENS ACTIVE

A Generally Firm Tone in the Early Dealings.

Further Advances in the Anthracite Coal Group and the Granger Interests—Operations in the Industrial Quarter Light—Federal Steel Steady—Sugar Refining Stronger.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—The Stock Market today opened fairly active and with a generally firm tone prevailing.

Further advances in the anthracite coal group and in the granger shares made them the conspicuous quarters of the market.

More encouraging estimates as to the final outcome of the crops apparently accounted for the pronounced strength of the granger shares, while nothing that was novel was mentioned in connection with the anthracite coal stocks.

Among the lower price issues, Chesapeake and Ohio was strong and Missouri Pacific, Union Pacific, and Cincinnati, Cleveland, Chicago, and St. Louis were dealt in at advances.

In the industrial quarter, the dealings were on a comparatively light scale. Federal Steel was steady and Sugar Refining showed more strength than for some time. The London market was again firm.
