DEATH OF DR. MCGUIRE

Served as Chief Surgeon With Stonewall Jackson's Corps.

One of the Most Distinguished Practitioners of the South--His Valuable Aid to the Confederacy During the Civil War--Presented With a Sword by the Great General.

RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 20.--Dr. Hunter McGuire, the chief surgeon of Stonewall Jackson's Corps and one of the best-known medical men of the South, died here yesterday morning. His death occurred six months to a day from the time he was stricken with paralysis.

Dr. McGuire is survived by the following children: Dr. Stuart McGuire and Mr. Hunter McGuire, jr., of Richmond, and Dr. Hugh H. McGuire, of Alexandria; Mrs. Virginia Law Clay, of Savannah, Ga., and Misses Pamte, Gussie, Gettie, and Margaret McGuire, of Richmond. Mrs. McGuire, who survives her husband, was Miss Annie Stuart, a daughter of Hon. Alex. H. Stuart, of Augusta county, Va.

Dr. McGuire was born in Winchester, Va., October 11, 1835. He was the son of Hugh H. McGuire, M. D., who was, in his time, one of the most noted surgeons of Virginia. The family had resided in the city of Virginia since the coming of their ancestor, Edward McGuire, from Ireland, in the latter half of the last century.

On the maternal side Dr. McGuire's ancestry was also of Irish origin, and in this line was Hunter Holmes, whose name Dr. McGuire bore. This doughty warrior fell in the battle of Mackinaw, in 1814, and his remains were buried in the city of Winchester. Dr. McGuire devoted himself to the study of literature from an early age, and was graduated by Winchester College in 1855. He continued his studies at the University of Pennsylvania and Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, and became a professor of anatomy at Winchester Medical College in 1856.

Dr. McGuire continued as chief surgeon of the Second Corps under General Ewell, serving in the defeat of Milroy at Winchester, the battle of Gettysburg, and the campaign in the mountains of North and South Spottsylvania to Cold Harbor. Subsequently he acted as medical director of the Army of the Valley under Early, participating in his mortal illness, and was against Washington and in the battles of Winchester, Fisher's Hill, and Waynesboro.
