THE REMOVAL OF ASHES

Complaint That Collectors Are Careless and Inefficient.

Superintendent Stutler Reports to the Commissioners That Household Holders Must Put This Refuse Into Metal Receptacles, Not in Barrels or Boxes—Other District Matters.

W. C. Severn, of 210 First Street northeast, has sent a communication to the Commissioners, in which he complains of the failure of the employees of the contractor to collect ashes from barrels and cans for a ruling as to whether the drivers can be required to remove ashes from barrels.

Mr. Severn states that he complained once in the office of the Superintendent of Street Cleaning, and that the latter caused the driver of wagon No. 13 to do his work properly for a few days, when it ended.



THE COMMISSIONERS' ORDERS. Changes Made in the Service of the Water Department.

That Mr. R. D. Stums, Superintendent of Property, is directed to proceed from Washington, D. C., to Dickerson, Md., and return, on business connected with the procuring of stone from the District quarry at Dickerson.

Theft of a Bicycle Reported. Sanford Eddie, of 725 Thirtieth Street north west, has reported to the police that his Fowler bicycle valued at \$10 was stolen from in front of 1010 Pennsylvania Avenue northwest yesterday.

Little Boy Badly Hurt. Clarence Lockyer, seven years old, of 1453 Sampson Street northwest, fell through an open cellar trap at 114 Fourteenth Street and was badly cut about the head. His wounds were treated at the Homeopathic Hospital.

DEATHS IN THE DISTRICT. General Mortality Declines as Compared With Previous Week.

There was a decline in the number of deaths during the past week as compared with the week before. The deaths numbered 53, as against 105, and the death rate fell from 19.60 to 15.49 per each thousand of the population.

Of the deaths 46 were white and 37 colored. Mortality from consumption increased from 14 to 17, and that from diseases of the brain and nervous system decreased from 14 to 12. There were 5 fatal cases of typhoid fever, 2 of whooping cough, and 2 of diphtheria. But 1 death from violence occurred. This was by street car accident.

At the close of last report there were 52 cases of diphtheria in quarantine. During the week 17 new cases occurred and 9 were discharged, leaving 50 cases under observation in 33 premises.

Of scarlet fever there were 44 cases in quarantine at the close of last report. During the week 14 new cases were reported, and 12 were discharged, leaving 46 cases, with warning cards, in 36 premises.

No new case of smallpox was reported during the week, the single case reported on the 2d of the month being still in hospital, convalescent.

The mean weather conditions prevalent during the week were: temperature of the atmosphere, 40 degrees; barometer, 30.39, and relative humidity, 67. There was no rainfall, and winds northwesterly, averaging 7 miles per hour. The highest temperature of the air was 58 degrees, on the 13th, and lowest 25 degrees, on the 17th.

BOTH PLEAD NOT GUILTY. George and Lewis Bradley Held for the Grand Jury.

George A. Bradley, the teller in the Washington Savings Bank, who is charged with the larceny of three United States Government bonds of the denomination of \$1,000 each, today pleaded not guilty, waived an examination and was held for the action of the grand jury in \$5,000 bonds.

His brother Lewis J. Bradley, who was charged with receiving two of the stolen bonds, also pleaded not guilty, waived an examination and was held in \$5,000 bonds for the action of the grand jury.
