MOUNTAIN LAND SOLD.

The Chesapeake-Western Company invests in Virginia property.

HARRISBURG, Va., Feb. 22--A deed has been recorded here which conveyed to the Chesapeake-Western Company about 50,000 acres of mountain land known as the Hollingsworth Survey, which lies in the counties of Rockingham, Augusta, and Pendleton. The granters are Mrs. Mary H. Murray, of Anne Arundel county, Maryland, and George A. Wheelock, of New York. The consideration was \$125,000, of which \$15,000 was paid cash.

The Chesapeake-Western Company is a corporation which was recently granted a charter in Richmond with a capital stock of \$1,000,000. Its headquarters are in New York city, is president, the company is an organization auxiliary to the Chesapeake and Western Railroad Company, which operates at present between Elkton and Bridgewater, in this county. The Chesapeake-Western Company is formed to develop timber, coal, bark, and mineral interests along the line of the projected extension of the railroad.

THE WASHINGTON FAMILY
Its Genealogy Traced to the Early Part of the Twelfth Century.

An Interesting Address to the Young Men's Society of the Mount Vernon M. E. Church--Arrival of the First President's Ancestors in America. His Birth and Early Life.

The genealogy and early life of George Washington was the interesting topic of an address delivered recently before the Young Men's Society of the Mount Vernon M. E. Church by L. S. Cannon. During the course of his remarks Mr. Cannon said:

"The genealogy of the Washington family, which is shown to be of an ancient English stock, has been traced back to the early part of the century immediately preceding the Conquest, which took place in the year 1066. At that time landed estates and manorial privileges were enjoyed only by those, or their descendants, who had accompanied William the Conqueror from Normandy, or had fought under his standard. All landed property in those warlike times implied military services. Among the knights who held estates on warlike conditions was William de Herburn, the progenitor of the Washingtons. The name William indicated Norman descent. The surname de Herburn was taken from the name of a village which was situated on the estate he held in the county of Lurham; probably the same village now called Hartburn on the banks of the Tees.

"Norman families of rank usually took surnames from their castles or estates, but it was after the Conquest that the common people assumed surnames. The custom of the surnames was brought from the Continent to this country by the family, about fifty years before the Conquest; but did not become universally settled for several centuries afterward. At first they did not descend to the younger family, but changed with the change of estates.

"About 1183 William de Herburn exchanged his village of Herburn for the manor and village of Wessington, and the family consequently assumed the surname de Wessington, which name existed in England prior to the Conquest, and is probably of Saxon origin. The village of Wessington is mentioned in a Saxon charter as early as 973.

In the Thirteenth Century.

"In 1284, about 200 years after the Conquest, we find the name William Washington, of Wessington, in connection with the same estates. About 1287 the name had been changed in spelling to De Wessington, when Sir William de Wessington, as son and heir, succeeded to the estate, Pean de Sio, and Crege de Chine, some with revers; others with Persian and gold trimmings. ton, in Lancashire. This Laurence Washington was afterward granted the manor of Sulgrave, in Northamptonshire, which remained in the family until 1620, and was called Washington's manor.

Loyal to Charles I.

"History shows that the Washingtons adhered loyally and generously to the cause of Charles I, and afterward, because of their adherence to the house of Stuart and because of the attempt at a general insurrection in 1655, they incurred displeasure and probably the vengeance of Cromwell and his followers. They sought refuge in other lands, whether they shared in the conspiracy or not. This may have been the case with John and Augustus Washington, two brothers, great-grandsons of Laurence Washington, the grantee of Sulgrave. These two brothers arrived in Virginia in 1657 and purchased a tract of land near the mouth of the Potomac and Rappahannock Rivers. John Washington married a Miss Anne Pope and became an extensive planter and a member of the House of Burgesses. We find him, as Colonel Washington, exhibiting the old military spirit of the family, leading forces against a band of Seneca Indians who were ravishing settlements along the Potomac.

"His estate continued in the family through his son Lawrence and grandson Augustus, who died in 1730. He was buried in a vault on Bridge Creek, which for generations was the family burying-place.

"The second wife of Augustus Washington was a woman of noble lineage, married March 6, 1730. By her he had four sons and two daughters. The eldest son of this union was George Washington, who was born on February 11, 1732, according to the records of the parish of St. Andrew, which were preserved in the new style, or Gregorian calendar, did not occur in England or her colonies until September, 1752, more than twenty years after the date of his birth.
