

STOCK MARKET FEVERISH

Business Heavy, But No Particular Tendency in Prices.

No Confirmation of the Burlington Deal - A Fine General Electric Statement - The Money Outlook Under Discussion in Wall Street.

NEW YORK, April 12.—The Stock Market opened active and feverish with declines and advances in comparison with last night's final figures being about evenly divided.

Little that was of interest bearing upon the market appeared in this morning's news. As was the case yesterday, interest centered largely around the probabilities of the money market, with some discussion regarding tomorrow's probable showing by the banks in their weekly statement.

There was no confirmation of any of the rumors recently current which have been effective in shaping the movements in a large number of stocks. Active features at the opening were Texas and Pacific, the Erie issues, Burlington and Quincy and Northern Pacific. Both Northern Pacific and Burlington advanced, the former from 10 1/2 to 11 1/2, the latter from 10 1/2 to 11 1/2.

Further sharp decline appeared in St. Paul, although subsequently the stock rallied. The market for the day was actively dealt in at about last night's final level. The anthracite coal stocks generally were reactionary, particularly for the Reading issue.

Sugar refining in the industrial quarter showed a decline which has been effective in shaping the movements in a large number of stocks. Active features at the opening were Texas and Pacific, the Erie issues, Burlington and Quincy and Northern Pacific. Both Northern Pacific and Burlington advanced, the former from 10 1/2 to 11 1/2, the latter from 10 1/2 to 11 1/2.

The magnificent statement of the General Electric Company, published this morning, led to a further advance in that stock and the copper stocks, which were actively dealt in, were reactionary. Anaconda mining was shown at a sharp decline in the London market.

The local traction issues were weak in sympathy with the general market, but there was no particular news of concern attending their course.

The Stock Market this morning showed no particular tendency, the market making advances during the first hours and some declining from a fraction to a point or more. Prices were for the most part off at the opening. Later there was a slight reaction and then another reaction. None of these movements, however, was so general as to attract much attention. London was off somewhat. The gossip regarding the bank statement was generally somewhat pessimistic in its tenor, as the banks have lost money this week and the surplus reserve a week ago was not very large. The tendency of call loan rates to stiffen this week was again noticeable.

A rumor that Secretary Gage will buy \$10,000,000 in bonds was heard, but it was not confirmed at the Treasury Department. Some people who always take a rosy view of the situation, however, are of the opinion that Mr. Morgan must have received assurances from Mr. Gage before he left this country, that the Treasury will be able to keep money at rates early while the big money market is pending. They base this idea simply on what they consider the inherent probability of the market during the past week, and that Mr. Morgan has been markedly bullish in fact since Mr. Morgan called for the other side. The most conservative people in the Street still favor selling stocks to take profits on the bulge.

Burlington and Northern Pacific were both advanced at the opening. Burlington setting up to 131 in a few quotations. The absence of confirmation for the Burlington deal story is becoming irksome to the Street and if it were not for the advance in the bears hold any market development with which the Street is connected. There would be a determined attack on both Burlington and Northern Pacific. Neither of these securities is safe at these prices for anyone outside the deal. If, like the St. Paul, Burlington could not be sold at its present price again in twenty years.
