## AFFAIRS OF THE DISTRICT

### A Citizen Complains of Dust From Railroad Crossings.

Oil Sprinkling Suggested as a Means to Abolish the Altered Nuisance. Permits to String Wires and Remove Poles—Other Local Matters.

## NEWS FROM GEORGETOWN.

### Efforts to Relieve the Lintinum Institute From Taxation.

The trustees of Lintinum Institute have decided to go before Congress in December next and ask for relief from the payment of over \$3,800, which has accumulated in taxes against the Institute property. The Assessor for the District has notified the Institute of this action for relief to the Commissioners, and the District Attorney has made it a matter of special consideration. The District officials are anxious to afford the relief asked, but are restrained by technical legislation.

The Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company recently filed application for permits to string wires and to remove poles as follows: To string two wires from cable pole in the alley of square bounded by Chapman Street and Welling Place, Fourteenth and Fifteenth Streets northwest, across Welling and Euclid Places to the residence of P. C. Knox, at the northwest corner of Fourteenth Street and Euclid Place; to connect premises 323 New York Avenue northwest with a three wire service from pole in the alley in the rear; to erect a pole on the south side of Clifton Street, near Fourteenth Street northwest; to move pole 67-A in alley of square 67.

Amelia H. Love, of 1426 Florida Avenue, has made complaint to the Commissioners against the throwing of refuse in the street near her home, especially paper and the parings from fruit. She states that the surroundings are much marred by this practice, and asks that steps be taken to prevent the nuisance. The matter was investigated by the Police Department. Lieut. John Kenney, of the Eighth precinct, reported that he had visited the locality in person and failed to find the conditions described. However, he sent a warning to certain fruit vendors in the neighborhood, who promised to exercise care in the future. It is understood that Mrs. Love will be informed in accordance with Lieutenant Kenney's report.
