NEEDED IN CURRANT CULTURE.

Sulphate of Copper in Great Demand in Parts of Greece.

Frederick W. Hoosfield, the United States Consul at Trieste, Austria, writes to the State Department that there is a considerable demand in the currant-growing districts of Greece for sulphate of copper.

Greece's alone imported over 2,000 tons of this commodity last year. Nearly all the importations have so far come from Great Britain, which has furnished a satisfactory article.

Mr. Dutton's Appointments in the Fire Department.

The Health Officer Recommends the Construction of a Sewer in the Interest of Public Health—An Improper Assessment—Other Matters.

Robert W. Dutton, Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, has recommended the list of appointments for the department, to take effect July 1.

Mr. Dutton also recommended the reduction of Private C. E. Shafer to the position of watchman and the promotion of Watchman William H. J. Jurdakamp to private.

Dr. William C. Woodward, the Health Officer, recently forwarded to the Commissioners a recommendation to the effect that the construction of a sewer for the drainage of lots 14 and 12, Trinidad, was necessary for the public health of that locality.
