MARYLAND NEWS NOTES. Frederick Kintz died in Frederick yesterday, aged eighty-two years. Edwin Wells, formerly of Elkton, Md., died Wednesday at his home in Montgomery county, Pa.

A public fountain presented to Hagerstown by ex-Mayor S. M. Bloom was put into operation yesterday. The Maryland Summer School at the Agricultural Experiment Station closed yesterday. Nineteen students took the course.

J. Hart Shubert, a Baltimore and Ohio brakeman, aged thirty years, was killed by an engine in the yard at Conellsville on Wednesday. Several hundred bushels of wheat in the shock on the farm of Theodore Ott, on Elk River, Cecil county, were destroyed by fire Wednesday.

Farmers living on Everts Creek, below Cumberland, report a shower of loads, or "ice," of corn, on Wednesday. They said the loads came down, apparently from the clouds, by the thousand.

Charles E. Reynolds has been appointed mail carrier of the new free mail delivery route in Cecil county, from Rising Sun to the town of Farmington, in all a distance of twenty-three miles. The salary is \$500 per year. The route takes in 179 houses, with a population of about 200.

"Pud" Davis, the Howard county negro charged with attempting a felonious assault, who was arrested on Wednesday night, yesterday admitted his guilt when confronted by his intended victim, a little girl named Nora Cross. She is the daughter of Hanson Cross, of the district of Howard county. Justice Baker committed Davis to jail.

It is reported from Ocean City that Tuesday two of Joseph Henry's children were burned to death in his barn, which was struck by lightning, and that two others were found in a thicket near by—one a boy of eight, dead, and a girl of five unconscious. The barn, with twelve horses and cattle and a large quantity of hay and grain, was destroyed.

George Cooper, a colored barber who was a property owner and respected citizen of Cumberland, was buried Wednesday with considerable ceremony. The First Western Maryland Band, in full uniform, led the funeral procession, followed by the Ladies' Society. A large number of people attended the funeral.

A carnival of Washington county bands of music is an attraction promised in the near future to be held on the Hagerstown fair grounds. The bands of Hagerstown, Keydenville, Rohrersville, Williamsport, Smithsburg, Hagerstown, Westboro, and Oronokeville, in all 100 musicians, will consolidate into one organization. There will be four horse races, two bicycle races and a foot race in addition to the music.
