REGISTER DENT SAVED HIMSELF.

NEW CODE MADE OFFICE SURE.
 Secured the Passage of an Amendment Exempting It From the Repealing Clause Affecting Others.

"It looks as if I am the only Federal official in the District whose position is made certain and secure," Louis A. Dent, Register of Wills, said today in discussing the new code.

It will be remembered that when the new code was before Congress for adoption strenuous efforts were made to legislate Mr. Dent out of his position by abolishing the office of Register of Wills. After a hard fight, before the District committee of the House and Senate, Mr. Dent succeeded in having the section of the new code providing for the abolishment of his office stricken out, and in its place an amendment making him even more secure in his office.

Laugh on the Other Side.
 Now Mr. Dent feels that he has the laugh on those who desired to retire him to private life. He believes there is hardly a Federal office in the District whose tenure of office is not made dubious by the new code, except that of the Register of Wills.

It is contended by some leaders of the District Bar that the new code adopted on March 3 last, which will go into effect on January 1, 1902, by its repealing clause, legislates many Federal officials in the District out of office. Mr. Dent saves himself from the effect of this repealing clause by having the exception referred to inserted.

Opposed to Being Ousted.
 He laughingly said today that he did not propose to be ousted from the body of the code and then have his office wiped out, by its repealing clause. Amendment's providing against the effect of this legislation have been prepared, and will be submitted at the coming session of Congress.

There is considerable doubt in the minds of some persons who have given the subject careful and serious consideration if these amendments will be considered until after the Christmas holidays.

COLONEL BIDDLE RETURNS.
 The Engineer Commissioner Again Takes Up Work of Office.

Col. John Biddle, the Engineer Commissioner, is at his desk today, having arrived in Washington this morning from Detroit, whither he went to attend the funeral of his father, William S. Biddle. Colonel Biddle stated that out of a family of eight children all were present at the obsequies except one of the sons who is at present in South Africa.

CAPTAIN COOK EXCUSED.
 Relieved From Menet Court-Martial Because of Ill-Health.

Capt. Francis A. Cook, a member of the Naval Retiring Board, who was designated as a member of the court-martial appointed for the trial of Col. Robert L. Meade, now in session at the New York Navy Yard, has been excused from further service in that capacity and ordered to return to his regular station in this city.
