A coroner's jury yesterday investigated the circumstances attending the death of Mary Morrison, colored, who was killed Sunday evening at Waterloo, by a southbound passenger train. George Bryan was foreman, and the jury returned a verdict to the effect that she was killed by the train, and that the woman came to her death by being struck by an engine, but there was no evidence elicited giving the details of the accident. A sister of the dead woman has claimed the remains, and they are still at the undertaking establishment of William Demaine & Sons, but will be interred some time tomorrow.

As yet, no one has come forward to claim the body of the man slain by the train at Waterloo, which is now at the same undertaking establishment. Thomas, if that be his name, came here Saturday last, from Burke's Station over the Southern Railway, and when the train pulled into the depot he was taken ill, and afterward sent to the Alexandria Infirmary, where he died a few hours afterward. The remains were not claimed today they will be interred in the Penny Hill Cemetery at the expense of the city.

The Alexandria County Court was in session yesterday, with Judge J. M. Love presiding. In the matter of Isaac Thelwell, colored, on a writ of habeas corpus, argument was heard and the prisoner was remanded to jail to serve out the remainder of his sentence.

CHARTERS GRANTED NEW CORPORATIONS.

A BALL-BEARING RIFLE COMPANY.

Two Insurance Concerns Also Authorized to Do Business. Papers Filed With the Recorder of Deeds.

A certificate of the incorporation of "The Ball-Bearing Rifle Company" was placed on file today in the office of the Recorder of Deeds.

The object of the organization is stated to be "the manufacture of ordnance and munitions of war." The capital stock is stated to be \$500,000, divided into shares at \$10 each.

The incorporators are Orlan C. Cullen, E. W. Anderson, E. D. Cullen, West Stewart, and George M. Anderson.

OFFICE OF CORONER VACANT.

Another Defect Found in the New District Code. A fact of which most people are not aware is that the District of Columbia will be without a Coroner for several days, beginning tomorrow.

The new code, which goes into effect tomorrow, makes the appointment of the District Coroner one of the duties of the President of the United States. The present Coroner, Dr. J. Ramsey Nevitt, having been appointed by the District Commissioners, therefore will go out of office tonight.

A few weeks ago the Commissioners forwarded a recommendation to the Senate Committee on the District of Columbia making an amendment to the code which transfers the appointment of the coroner back to the Commissioners.

The District Commissioners, knowing that the Code would on January 1 end the term of the present Coroner, laid the matter before President Roosevelt, calling his attention to the provision of the new law and also to the pending amendment.

The Commissioners asked the President to appoint Dr. Nevitt, which he agreed to do. It was found, however, that there was no precedent for making appointments of the coroner during recess of Congress, and the President informed the Commissioners this morning that he would be unable to make the appointment before the meeting of Congress.

This leaves the office vacant. The code, however, leaves the appointment of the Deputy Coroner in the hands of the Commissioners, and it has been decided that Dr. Glazebrook, the Deputy Coroner, shall act as Coroner until the appointment of Dr. Nevitt by the President according to the terms of the code.
