NEWS FROM GEORGETOWN.

Flames Damage a Lunch Room on M Street.
The lunch room and oyster house kept by George Hilton, at 3602 M Street, was damaged by fire early this morning to the extent of about \$100. The adjoining premises, 3604 M, were also slightly damaged. An overheated stove was the cause of the fire.

The extensive improvements at St. Alban's Church, on Wisconsin Avenue, near Woodley Lane, will be completed today. The pulpit stands directly over the remains of Bishop Clagett, the first Bishop of Maryland.

Dr. Havenner as pastor of the Episcopal Church of Georgetown and who since his transfer from the local church has been in charge of the Fayette Street Methodist Episcopal Church of Baltimore, will not take a year's rest after the convening of the Baltimore conference as contemplated. He is now well enough to take another assignment.

A Small Fire on M Street.
Fire, which is said to have started from an overheated boiler, broke out about 5:30 o'clock this morning in the one-story frame building 3602 M Street northwest, owned by Goddard Bros., and used as an oyster house by George Hilton. When Engine No. 5 arrived in response to an alarm from box 71, the firemen broke in the front door and quickly extinguished the flames, which had spread to the adjoining building, 3604, owned by Mrs. Miss Viola Burrows, and yet within one year had not exceeded \$10.
