ARRESTED IN BALTIMORE.

Secret Service Division Advised of Capture of Jack Mulvey.

The United States Secret Service received information this morning of the arrest at Baltimore yesterday of Jack Mulvey, alleged to be a notorious criminal. Mulvey was arrested on the charge of passing counterfeit silver coin, and gave him name as John H. Cleary.

He is said to be old and experienced in the school of crime, and this is one of the cases cited by the Secret Service in support of the bill pending before the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives intended to impose additional punishment on habitual offenders against the statutes governing counterfeiting.
