FUNERAL OF MAJOR BATES.

Remains of Gallant Officer Laid to Rest at Arlington.

The last rites over the remains of the late Major Robert F. Bates, U. S. A., retired, who died at his home, 1253 Harvard Street northwest, at an early hour Thursday morning, were held at Arlington cemetery yesterday afternoon.

Brief services were held at the family home. Dr. Kelley, pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian Church, of which the deceased was a constant attendant, made a few remarks about the deceased soldier. The remains were then taken to Arlington, where the final ceremonies were held. Chaplain Pierce, of the United States Army, officiated.

Major Bates was fifty-eight years old. He is survived by a widow.
