

FAT MEN BOWLERS DEFEAT TAKOMA TEAM

Losers Complimented For Excellent Showing.

Match Played on New Alleys of the Takoma Park Club—Score 2,269 Pins to 1,956.

The Jolly Fat Men's Club bowling team journeyed out to Takoma Park last night and played a match game with the team of the Takoma Park Club on the new alleys of the latter organization.

The Fat Men defeated the Takoma team by a decisive score, but they paid their opponents the compliment of telling them they were the best new players they had ever encountered.

The Fat Men made a total of 2,269 pins in the match, or an average of 7.66 per game and 151 pins per man. The Takoma team made a total of 1,956 pins, or an average of 6.52 each game and 136 for each man.

EXPENSES NECESSARY FOR NEW WHITE HOUSE

President's Views Concerning Funds Required for Improvements.

Senators Allison, Hale, and Cockrell and Representatives Cannon, Hemenway, and McRae, the conference committee of the two houses of Congress on the urgent deficiency bill, visited the President this morning for the purpose of ascertaining his wishes regarding the amount of the appropriation necessary for the White House renovation.

Mr. Roosevelt's estimate of the amount of money needed for the work was carefully noted. About \$350,000 will be required to make the improvements and legislation covering the whole expenditure will be now authorized.

SEVERELY ARRAIGNED BY MINORITY LEADER

Mr. Richardson Reads a Lesson to the House Majority.

Under general debate on the general deficiency bill today Representative Richardson (Dem., Tenn.), the minority leader, took occasion to arraign the majority for its alleged political sins of omission and commission.

He said there had not been a time in recent years when there had been so much discord and lack of harmony in the Republican party as at the present time. He declared that the dominant party had come into power under certain promises and pledges to the public which it had failed to fulfill.

NEWS AND GOSSIP FROM GEORGETOWN

J. Craig, owner, and J. Hughes, builder, have secured permits for the erection of two frame dwellings on the west side of Thirty-third Street, near its intersection with Thirty-second Street, to cost \$4,500.

Trinity Parochial School for Boys closed today. The commencement exercises began at 10 o'clock. The four students making the highest average of the year will be awarded scholarships in Georgetown University. Premiums will also be awarded those making high averages in any particular study.

For many years the Trinity School has been taught by salaried teachers. Next year the Sisters of Mercy will have charge of the school. Before the beginning of the next school term it is expected to have the parish hall and schoolhouse under construction. The authorities of Trinity Church, it is stated, are now in search of quarters for the Sisters.

A game of baseball was played yesterday afternoon on the campus of the Georgetown University. The contestants were teams picked from the members of the 1902 graduating class and the members of the faculty of the university.

The graduating class was the victor by the score of 13 to 7.

CONGRESS HEIGHTS TO HAVE AN ENGINE HOUSE

Plans for a Fine Structure Now Nearing Completion.

The District Commissioners today ordered the advertisement for proposals for constructing the engine house on Congress Heights. An appropriation for this structure was contained in the District appropriation bill approved March 1, 1901, the amount being \$25,000 for the building and furniture. The site for the building was donated by Col. E. A. Randie last March, and the plans for the structure are in the hands of the inspector of Buildings, rapidly approaching completion.

When completed the engine house will be the largest of its character in the District. It will be eleven feet longer than the houses at Tenleytown and Brookland, and will contain several improvements which the earlier buildings did not have.

Colonel Kandle has taken great interest in the preparation of the plans for this building, having visited the District Building frequently to inspect them and to note their progress. He stated today that he was pleased with the work of the office of the Inspector of Buildings, and thought that the District would give Congress Heights one of the finest firehouses to be had for the money appropriated.

Proposals will also be received within a few days for the boring of the well on the site of the proposed building, and it is expected that the work on it will be begun before the end of the month.

DR. DEXTER'S FUNERAL.

Prominent Citizen of District to Be Laid to Rest Tomorrow.

The funeral of Dr. James E. Dexter, a well known physician of this city, and at one time secretary of the District Board of Health, will be held tomorrow afternoon. Interment will be made at the Arlington National Cemetery at 2 o'clock, under the auspices of Burnside Post, G. A. R., and the Sons of Jonadab, of which organizations he was long a prominent member.

The pallbearers have not been appointed, although it is understood that five members of the former society will act with three from the latter.

Dr. Dexter served with distinction during the civil war, and by order of General Sickles was made medical inspector of the Third Army Corps. He was appointed as the commissioner from the District to the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition in 1876 by President Grant.
