

COLLIERY WHISTLES WILL BLOW TUESDAY

The Striking Miners Must Work or Be Shut Out Until Spring.

OPERATORS SERVE NOTICE

Declaration That Strike Will Not Be Arbitrated Has Cast Gloom Over Entire Coal Region—National Guard Ready for Immediate Duty.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Aug. 27.—Much activity is being displayed by non-union company hands today in cleaning up debris about Indian Ridge, Shenandoah City, Kohlburn and West Shenandoah operations, which indicates that an attempt will soon be made to ship coal from the four big Reading operations.

Must Work or Be Shut Out.

The company served notice on the inhabitants of the mining town last night that the colliery whistles would be blown next Tuesday and Wednesday, and that if the miners did not respond in sufficient numbers to work the operations satisfactorily the plant would not be started up until next spring.

No Hope of Arbitration.

Strike leaders are busy today traveling through the region urging men not to be discouraged over President Baer's latest statement after seeing J. Pierpont Morgan that there will be no concessions to the United Mine Workers' Union.

Troops Prepared for Emergency.

The troops in camp here were under orders last night to be prepared for an emergency call to the disturbed districts between this place, Lansford, and Hazleton on account of a fear that strikers would make a night attack on collieries in order to capture non-union men.

Mines Open at Wilkesbarre.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 27.—Two more mines were opened this morning, the Dorrance of the Lehigh Valley Coal Company, in this city, and the Cranberry of the A. Pardee & Co., at Hazleton.
