

SUICIDE RECORD FIVE CASES IN ONE WEEK

Worst Figures in History of Health Office.

The most striking feature of the weekly report of the Health Department issued today for the week ending Saturday was five deaths by suicide. This is said to be the largest number of suicides in one week since the recording of deaths began in the department. Three of the suicides sought death by hanging, one by cutting his throat, and one by taking carbolic acid.

The number of cases of typhoid fever under treatment took a sudden drop during last week. There were 394 cases on record Monday, and 353 on Saturday night, 61 new cases having been reported, and 102 cases discharged. The number of new cases was large, and there were 8 deaths.

There were 118 deaths in the District during the week ended on Saturday last, as compared with 99 in the previous week and 110 in the corresponding period of last year. The death rate was 20.9 last week, 17.6 for the previous week and 20.5 for the corresponding period of last year. Of the decedents 63 were white, representing a death rate of 16.1, and 55 colored, rate 32.

Compared with the preceding week deaths from affections of the kidneys increased from 2 to 10, and from consumption they declined from 17 to 10. There were 8 fatal cases of typhoid fever, 2 of diphtheria and 1 of whooping cough. By violence there were 7 deaths, 2 being accidental and 5 suicidal. Of the accidental deaths 1 was by fracture of the skull and 1 by asphyxiation from foreign body in the larynx.

The births reported numbered 113, of which 71 were white and 42 colored; the males being 50 and females 63. At the close of the last report there were 9 cases of scarlet fever in quarantine. During the week 7 new cases occurred and 1 was discharged, leaving 15 cases with warning cards in 12 premises.

Of diphtheria 11 cases were in quarantine. Nine new cases were reported during the week and 6 were discharged, leaving 14 cases in 11 premises.

The cases of typhoid fever continued from the former week were 394. During last week 61 new cases were reported and 102 cases discharged, leaving 353 cases under medical supervision at the close of this report.

At the end of last report there were 6 cases of smallpox in the hospital. There were no new cases, and 2 patients were discharged, leaving 4 cases in the institution at the close of the report.

The following were the deaths classified according to their causes: Apoplexy, 2; bronchitis, 3; congestion of lungs, 1; consumption, 10; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; diphtheria, 2; diseases of brain, 5; diseases of heart, 13; diseases of kidneys, 15; malignant erythema, 5; meningitis, 2; pneumonia, 7; suicides, 5; typhoid fever, 8; whooping cough, 1; miscellaneous, 24. Total, 118.

SIXTY-SEVEN MILLIONS FOR THE NAVY IN A YEAR

Admiral Kenny Urges Improved Facilities.

Admiral Kenny, Paymaster General of the Navy, has submitted his report for the fiscal year ended June 30 last. It shows that \$66,593,983.98 was expended. Of this \$14,592,921.77 was paid for the construction of new ships; nearly \$6,600,000 for the repairs to vessels, and \$14,385,570.62 for the maintenance of the men.

Admiral Kenny makes an urgent plea for better facilities for his department. He recommends an enlargement of the storage plants at Boston, Washington, Norfolk, Mare Island, and Puget Sound. The necessity of greater facilities at these places, he states, is necessary to the good conduct of the department.

The buildings in this city and Norfolk, Admiral Kenny says, are of an obsolete type, in which modern appliances cannot with safety be installed. He also asks for an additional force of officers in this department of the navy.

MATTERS OF INTEREST IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS.

The resignation of James A. Huels, booster in the Water Department, to take effect October 15, has been accepted by the Commissioners.

The Commissioners have directed that the public hay scale be removed to Tenleytown from Eleventh and B Streets northwest, be located at the intersection of Brookfield Road and the Tenleytown Road.

The proposal of Charles White & Co. to furnish 360 lampposts at \$7.35 each, has been accepted by the Commissioners.

The Commissioners have approved a recommendation of the electrical engineer that arc lamps be erected as follows around Mt. Vernon Square, for the purpose of lighting the walks to be laid as approaches to the new library building: Four on the south side between Seventh and Ninth Street, two on the north side, one of the east side opposite K Street, and one on the west side opposite K Street.

Steel racks for the Patent Office books. Scientific Library to Be Stored on Modern Shelving.

STEEL RACKS FOR THE PATENT OFFICE BOOKS

Steel racks have been placed in the library of the Patent Office instead of the wooden cases that have been in use since the earliest days of the library. The new racks are of fine make, and arrangement, and add to the attractiveness of the library. An appropriation of \$5,000 was made for this work, and the forfeit of the contractors, who failed to get the racks placed in time, added materially to the funds at the disposal of Librarian H. L. Prince.

The books will be re-catalogued. It is said that this is the largest strictly scientific library in the world. It embraces the complete patent records of all nations issuing patents, and comprises, 76,000 volumes.

PHILIPPINE COINS.

BRIGHTWOOD SEWER PLANS TOO COSTLY

Commissioners Think \$633,585 Too Much to Spend.

The request of the Brightwood Citizens' Association for a trunk sewer east of Rock Creek to the District line will not be granted in its entirety. This has been decided by the District Commissioners, because, in their opinion, the expense involved would not be justified at the present time. The Superintendent of Sewers informed them that his office estimated the cost of the requested improvement at \$633,585.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR GREAT NAVAL WAR GAME

Admiral Dewey to Direct Fleet Maneuvers.

Arrangements for the great naval war game in the Southern seas this winter are now being made. Admiral Dewey will direct the fleet maneuvers, which will be begun on December 5. Rear Admiral Sumner, with Rear Admiral Crowninshield as second in command, will have charge of the hostile fleet, an amalgamation of the vessels of the European and South Atlantic stations. The defending force, the North Atlantic fleet, will be under command of Rear Admiral Higginson.

A scouting problem of extensive and intricate scale is being arranged. Rear Admiral Sumner's division will leave its rendezvous in the Gulf of Paria on December 5 and traverse the waters of the West Indies in an endeavor to locate the opposing force and to discover Rear Admiral Higginson's base of supplies. This search will continue for five days, and at its conclusion all the participating vessels will assemble on the south side of Culebra Islands, where Admiral Dewey will be in supreme command, having as his flagship the cruiser-yacht Mayflower. The smaller auxiliary vessels, the colliers, torpedo boat flotilla, and tugs, will be anchored in the adjacent bay known as Great Harbor.

It is expected that the Olympia will leave New York on Friday next, having as a convoy the colliers Lebanon, Brutus, and Sterling with eight coal barges, all under the protection of the gunboats Baneroff and Victoria. On their way to the West Indies the vessels will engage in a convoy problem, with the Olympia representing a powerful ship of an enemy.

Rear Admiral Coghlan will have charge of the work of preparing anchorage and landing places at Culebra. Tugs and converted yachts will be used during the maneuvers as tenders and picket boats.
