

CONFESSES HE KILLED PRIEST BY WATER CURE

Former Captain Brownell's Testimony Received

Cornelius M. Brownell, of Burlington, Vt., former captain in the Twenty-sixth Volunteer Infantry, has acknowledged that he authorized the administration of the water cure to "Father Augustine" at Banate in the Philippines, from the effects of which the priest died.

Brownell has also said that he made no report of Father Augustine's death to his senior officers, and insists that the water cure was administered solely as an act of war to secure information from the prisoner as to the whereabouts of the insurgents.

At no time has Captain Brownell declined to be examined by officers of the army sent to his home at Burlington, and he has freely assisted the authorities in their inquiry.

The investigation has shown conclusively that none of the regular officers of the army had any knowledge of the treatment of Father Augustine, nor had they any information regarding his death until the charges were made by the committee of Boston anti-imperialists.

SAYS COMMISSIONERS ARE SHIELDING REAL CULPRITS

He also denies the authority of the court to review the work of the auditors, because the sixty-day limit given by law for appealing from the reports has expired.

BILL FOR AN INSULAR MEDICAL CORPS PLAN

To Take Place of Contract and Volunteer Surgeons.

The Surgeon General of the army has received from the volunteer and contract army surgeons in the Philippines a draft of a bill recommended to be submitted to Congress providing for the organization of a foreign service medical corps, similar in its salient features to the British East Indian service and to the one France has on the Suez Canal.

The provisions of the bill give an increase of 145 in the personnel to the permanent medical corps of the army, without injustice to the present establishment. The proposed corps will entirely replace the present corps of volunteer and contract surgeons, many of whom have been in the service for four years and have now nothing to look forward to but muster out. The bill provides that the best men now holding volunteer commissions in the medical corps or contracts be selected for the new foreign service medical corps.

Attention has been called to the fact that the opening of a canal through the isthmus will call for a thorough sanitary policing of the route. Surgeons with tropical experience will also be needed for an indefinite time in the Philippines.

No decision has been reached as to whether the passage of the proposed bill will be recommended to Congress.
