ALL IN ONE NIGHT.

Number of Serious Accidents in the Vicinity of Pittsburgh. (By United Press.)

Pittsburgh, Pa., July 17.—A number of serious accidents occurred on the Pennsylvania Railroad during last night. Two men were killed and several others injured by a freight train near Jeannette. They are supposed to be traps.

Freeman J. Wise, of the accommodation, was probably fatally hurt when his engine, when he dropped the keys into the truck tank, while the train was running, the level slipped from his grasp, going down a steep embankment on the head. His skull was fractured.

Freight brakeman J. B. Walker slipped from the top of a box car and fell to the ground, where he grasped a rod and pulled himself from under the wheels of the following car. He was badly bruised and had nearly all of his clothing torn from his body.

Petition to the Governor.



WAS A GIANT SWINDLER

Raised a Quarter Million Dollars By His Forgeries.

Arrest of a Trinidad Magistrate in New York—Followed by British Officials For Years.

(By United Press.) New York, July 17.—Arthur C. Newson, formerly a magistrate on the island of Trinidad, was arrested to-day as a fugitive from justice. The arrest was made on a warrant sworn out by the British consul in this city, which, on information and belief, it is charged, that in 1852 Newson committed forgeries to a large amount and that he fled from the island to escape arrest.

On this he was brought before United States Commissioner Charles T. Loring and at the request of counsel for the consulate he was held for a hearing Friday, when it is expected that the evidence against the prisoner, which is said to be on his way here, will have arrived and extradition will be asked for.

Newson was at one time an official and a man of some importance in Trinidad. In 1852 it was found that he was converting a great deal of his possessions into cash, and an investigation was just about to be put on foot when he suddenly disappeared.

The investigation which followed showed that Newson had been committing many forgeries, and that by this means he had accumulated a large amount of money.
