PAID THE LAST PENALTY

James Travers Hanged For the Murder of Lena Gross.

EXECUTION WELL MANAGED

In the Opinion of the Attending Physicians Death was Instantaneous and Painless - In Six Minutes From the Time He Left His Cell All Was Over. Body Interred at Mt. Olivet.

The execution of James L. Travers, the colored man condemned to death for the murder of his mistress, Lena Gross, on the 19th of last November, took place at the District Jail shortly before noon yesterday.

Death was instantaneous, although there was some convulsing of the head and slight muscular contractions of the legs and body for several minutes afterwards.

The condemned man spent his last night in calm and quiet sleep, awaking shortly after 7 o'clock yesterday morning.

Before 1 o'clock the body had been taken from the jail, the expenses of the execution paid, and the return to the court required by law was in the hands of the clerk of the superior court.
