Edgewood Not to Be Sold

Mrs. Kate Chase to Retain Her Father's Home. Satisfactory Arrangements Almost Completed Whereby the Debt Will Be Discharged in Five Years.

The arrangements for the preservation of historic Edgewood to Mrs. Kate Chase have progressed so far and so favorably that there is no doubt that the property will be reconveyed to her by the Washington Loan and Trust Company. This company bought in the estate for about \$43,000, but in consideration of Mrs. Chase and of her father, the late chief justice, she was given an option until February, 1896, for a repurchase of the property.

Desperados in Charge Lunenburg County, Virginia, Is Under Their Control.

Story of John Dern, Who Fled to Richmond for Protection, Exciting Much Sympathy. (Special to The Times.)

Richmond, Va., July 24.—The story of the German John Dern, who, with his family, fled to Richmond from Lunenburg county and sought protection here at the hands of the German and A-Hungarian cohorts from a group of alleged desperados in Lunenburg who claim to be his wife and child, smashed up his household and threatened to kill him if he did not leave the county, has attracted widespread attention in this State.

Coming as it does upon the recent notorious murder trial in Lunenburg, where 120 soldiers were sent from Richmond to protect the three prisoners from being lynched by the citizens, the case created a sensation in the city.

It is understood that the two foreign consuls to whom the German has appealed will be unable to help him, as the man was recently naturalized.

Dern has papers to show that his property was destroyed and he was driven out of the county. He has a wife and child, the wife of his wife and child. He settled in Lunenburg three months ago, coming from New York.

A gentleman from Lunenburg who was charged with the practical case, who will give the story, says that the trouble arose over a piece of the foreigner who was forbidden by the alleged outlaws to do anything in the county.
