RACE WAR IN BRAZIL.

Greatly Strained Relations Between That Country and Italy.

New York, Aug. 9. - The Herald's special from Buenos Ayres says:

Rio Janeiro advises state that a serious fight occurred Wednesday between Brazilians and Italians on the line of the railroad in course of construction between Providence and Victoria. A large number of Italians were killed. The government is feared, will have a very bad effect on the relations existing between Brazil and Italy, which are already strained.

There is considerable excitement in Pernambuco, Brazil, over the alleged illegal imprisonment of many persons in that city and other arbitrary acts of Gov. Barbosa. He has levied a tax on foreign tonnage, despite the objection of foreign consuls. The diplomatic corps has united in a protest to the federal government.
