THEY NEED MORE TIME.

Observatory Scientist Trying to Ascertain What Was an Earthquake.

Considerable surprise is expressed here that the development in regard to the recent earthquake vibrations, so widely reported in other localities, have not been announced from any of the scientific bureaus in Washington.

When, three years ago, almost to the day, the great Charleston, S. C., occurred, a distinguished scientist of the Smithsonian Institution delivered an address in which he demonstrated that there was a volume left existing across the United States, of which Washington city was the very center. Elaborate preparations, it is understood, were therefore taken at the Naval Observatory and other points to register any future seismic disturbances, but without result.

It is said, however, that when the photographic plate of the Washington Monument, intended to have been automatically taken at the Naval Observatory Sunday morning, was developed to-morrow, some indications as to whether that great column, 554 feet high, deposited a trace of perpendicularity during the period of the earthquake shock, may be apparent.

BERLIN IN MODERN FEVER

Germans Intoxicated With the Glory of Sedan Day.

AMERICAN VETERANS THERE

Given the Place of Honor and Greeted Personally by Emperor William.

Berlin, Sept. 2.—The celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the fall of Sedan was continued to-day. The sun shone brightly and the weather was perfect. Immense crowds of sight-seers thronged the streets.

At 8 o'clock this morning Emperor William reviewed the First Regiment of the guards before the Schloss, and at the conclusion of the review personally decorated the standard of the troops with oak leaves. A half hour later his Majesty started for the parade ground, where he was to hold a review of the veterans of the Franco-Prussian war who had come from the United States to take part in celebrating the German victory.

The parade of troops and veterans on the Tempelhofer Feld was attended with unexampled splendor. The American veterans were given the place of honor in the right wing, near the Schloss. The weather was very warm and a haze hung over the scene.

At 8:45 o'clock the Emperor drove to the parade ground in a carriage drawn by four horses ridden by postilions. The carriage was preceded by a detachment of his Majesty's own body guards. The Emperor wore an ivory-tinted uniform consisting of a blue tunic and a red sash of the same color. His Majesty's carriage was followed by one containing the imperial princes.
