ENGINE HOUSE COMPLETED

New Quarters for Company No. 2
Ready for Occupancy.

Work of the Board of Assistant Assessors Resumed Under Resolution Extending Time.

The new habitation for Engine Company No. 2, located on D street northwest, near Ohio avenue, has been completed, and was inspected yesterday afternoon by the District Commissioners.

It is not known just when the company will abandon its old quarters, but it is a fair presumption that it will be within the next week.

The building is a neat one, two stories in height, and built after the modern style, with ample accommodations for the force. It is understood that Chief Parris contemplates transferring his official headquarters to the old building at an early date. His object is to be near the center of the important property district, in which the house is located, and to get more room. It is said that if he does not carry out this design that he will take rooms in the upper story of the new engine house.

The board of assistant assessors has very nearly completed the work of reassessing the realty within the original bounds of Washington, and the next to be taken up will be the Georgetown section, embracing 131 squares. After that will come the county reassessment, including improved and unimproved lands.

Under the joint resolution adopted by Congress and just approved by the President, the board has until the first Monday in April to make its report on city property, and succeeding that date will sit for two months as a board of equalization.

Beginning with the first Monday in September, the work of reassessment will be resumed, when the county work will be prosecuted to completion, and on the first Monday in November the board will again sit as a board of equalization, and will conclude it in time to submit its report on the first Monday in January, 1897.

No subsequent reassessment for a number of years will require the careful supervision that has been given it this year. Being the initial work under the law lately enacted, the board believed it to be necessary to inquire into the location and environments of every piece of individual property, and while doing this careful notes have been preserved which will be valuable as a reference hereafter.

George W. Ilac has been appointed inspector of the garbage plant and its surroundings, the order to take effect on the 27th instant. From this action of the Commissioners it is inferred that the new plant will soon begin operations. The compensation of the inspector is fixed at \$3 per day, and is payable out of the appropriation for collection and removal of garbage.

The Commissioners have sent to Congress the draft of a bill to provide compensation to the reporter of the District court of appeal. In the absence of such provision of law, that official is serving without pay.

Sold Land for \$100,000.
Commissioner Trossell, by deed filed yesterday, has sold to Florence Menefee parts of square 7, Eckington, and of Prospect lying west of and adjoining square 7 for \$100,000. The sale is subject to a trust for \$65,000.

TO COIN SILVER BULLION.

Orders Sent the Mints to Begin the Work.

Orders were sent yesterday by Mint Director Preston, by direction of Secretary Carlisle, to the mint superintendents, at Philadelphia, New Orleans, and San Francisco, to resume the coinage of silver dollars from the bullion purchased under the act of July 14, 1890.

The amount of silver bullion to be coined monthly until further orders is \$1,500,000 divided between the three mints as follows: Philadelphia, \$800,000; New Orleans, \$500,000, and San Francisco, \$100,000. Under the act of 1890 the Treasury has on hand \$177,000,000 of silver bullion, against which there are \$137,000,000 of notes out-

standing. Of the bullion purchased under this act \$40,000,000 has been coined.
