FEDERATION OF LABOR DECIDES TO FIGHT FOR THE EIGHT-HOUR DAY.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 25.—The third day's session of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor closed today. The eight-hour day was again taken up, the subcommittee recommending that the Carpenters' National Union be selected to make the first move toward the establishment of the eight-hour day.

If the employers do not come to terms with the members of all unions who work over time, a strike will be ordered. The strike, if it occurs, will be general, as the Federation has determined to push the eight-hour movement until it becomes a fixture.
