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POLICE WORKING TOO HARD

Petition the Alexandria Commissioners in the Matter.
Ask to Work Under the Old Rules Concerning Hours—Other News of the City.

Shortly after the organization of the present police board, on their recommendation the city council increased the police force of the city from seventeen to twenty-one men, including the chief, lieutenant and sergeant.

The police board adopted a rule establishing six beats and dividing the men into two squads, requiring each squad to do active service every other eight hours.

Supreme Court Lays Down a Precedent in Such Suits.
An important decision was rendered in the Supreme Court of the United States yesterday relating to the conditions under which beneficial society insurance must be conducted.

Mrs. Eugene Kalinski sued the Knights of Pythias to recover the value of an indorsement rank certificate held by her husband, A. Chille Kalinski, and the court awarded her \$3,000.

A rule of the order required the keeper of records and seals of the lodge to notify the endorsement rank officials whenever a member became delinquent.

After Durland had been incarcerated for about a month his counsel obtained a stay of proceedings from the United States Supreme Court until that tribunal could pass upon the case.
