THE SIXTY-EIGHTH SESSION

Philadelphia and Baltimore A. M. E. Conference Meets.

MANY MINISTERS HERE

Interesting Exercises Marked the Opening Day at Metropolitan Wesley Church—Bishop Petty Delivers the Episcopal Address—Conference Committees Named.

The sixty-eighth session of the Philadelphia and Baltimore conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, which was opened at noon yesterday in the Metropolitan Wesley Church on D street between Second and Third streets, south-west, promises to be an enthusiastic gathering of colored ministers and others connected with the church.

Bishop C. C. Petty, D. D., of Mobile, Ala., is the presiding officer. The conference is for the purpose of advancing the work of the church and the improvement of the ministry therein. The greatest interest has been manifested in the conference by the laymen generally and beside the seventy-five or more delegates, which includes a large number of ministers, there are many influential church members on hand.

The conference is to continue up to and including Monday evening next. The service yesterday afternoon included the opening exercises, a devotional service, the announcement of committees, etc. At 2 o'clock the sacrament of the holy communion was celebrated.

MANY ADDRESSES MADE. Last evening the program was quite a lengthy one, the episcopal address being delivered by Bishop Petty in place of the annual sermon, which had been announced. The several addresses of welcome were delivered and the responses made as follows:

WILL DRILL ALL SUMMER

Banco's Squadron to Be Maintained for Practice.

They Will Spend the Season in Maneuvers Along the Atlantic Coast.

The Navy Department has informed Rear Admiral Bance, commanding the North Atlantic station, that it proposes, if practicable, not to interfere in any manner with the movements and exercises of his squadron during the present season.

With this view Secretary Herbert has been obliged to decline the numerous requests he has received for ships to visit certain places and take part in local celebration and festivities.

The fleet will cruise at sea between Nantucket and the Cape of the Chesapeake. It will leave New York about July 15 provided its duties with the naval militia are then complete; it will cruise to the southward and enter Hampton Roads; thence to the northward to Gardiner's Bay, Fisher's Island, Nantucket Island and back to Hampton Roads early in October.

The maneuvers will consist of the various squadron movements and formations necessary for fleets and squadrons in time of war; anchoring and getting under way under different circumstances, signaling, target practice with main and secondary batteries and small arms; landing the naval brigade and boat drills and torpedo boat attacks.

Secretary Herbert is making every effort to collect a large fleet of battleships, monitors and cruisers to take part in these exercises. The vessels now under Rear Admiral Bance's command are the battleships Indiana and Maine, the monitor Amphitrite, the cruisers New York (flagship), Columbia, Newark, Cincinnati, Raleigh, Montgomery, the rammer Albatross, the torpedo boat Teror, the battleship Massachusetts and the monitor Terror will join the fleet before it leaves New York, and the Texas will soon follow.

This will be the largest fleet ever assembled by the Navy Department for instructions in fleet tactics, and the experience that will be gained will be of much benefit to the service.

INQUEST TO BE HELD TODAY.

Killing of Albert Jenkins and Freddie Smith to Be Investigated.

The bodies of Albert Jenkins and Freddie Smith, the eight-year-old lads who were run down and killed by a Baltimore and Ohio express train, yesterday morning, as told in yesterday's Evening Times, lay side by side last night on the rough table of the morgue. One white sheet covered both.

The accident occurred about 200 yards above the crossing at Florida avenue and Sixth street northeast, shortly before 1 o'clock. The train which killed the boys was running at a lively rate and was stopped only at Seventh street, three blocks away from the scene of the accident. The police of the Ninth precinct were notified and Officer Neff was sent to fetch the bodies with the patrol wagon and in which they were carried to the morgue. Officer Neff, who was accompanied by Officer Arrambault, then went to the Baltimore and Ohio depot to place the train under arrest, but they had gone out with the train and were not to be found.

The net was notified by the division superintendent to be in town today to attend the coroner's inquest. The trainmen are Ike Bromley, conductor; Henry Davis, engineer; and Harry Smith, fireman.

The father of Albert Jenkins is Cyrian W. Jenkins, a laborer, employed by the Hygienic Ice Company. Bert Smith's father is dead, and his step-father, Frank Lincoln, who works for Saxton, the contractor, did not know of the frightful accident until he reached his home at 7 o'clock last evening. Lincoln went immediately to the morgue and the scene there was indeed a pitiable one.

At the Ninth precinct station last night the police said no arrests had been made.

SIX MONTHS' SHRINKAGE.

Gold Reserve Has Lost \$77,339,339 Since January 1. The Treasury gold reserve at the close of business yesterday stood at \$103,200,194. The day's withdrawals were \$653,800. All the gold due under the last bond issue has now been paid into the Treasury. It amounted to \$113,265,612.07, of which \$100,000,000 was principal, \$11,186,246 premium, and \$2,079,366 interest.

BAD FOR DICKSON.

Graver Charges Hanging Over Him Than He Knows. William Dickson, the young colored man who was arrested by Detectives Boyd and Helan, Tuesday, while trying to pick the pockets of an aged woman, on Louisiana avenue, is having his criminal record looked up. Yesterday Judge Miller sent Dickson to the chain gang for three months. The detectives say there is a suspended sentence for larceny from the person hanging over the prisoner. If such is proven to be true, Dickson will be arraigned in the criminal court, and sent "over the road" to Albany.

He Obtains Judgment Against Saloon-keeper Miller. Mr. Charles E. Miller, who conducts a saloon at No. 937 D street, was sued yesterday afternoon before Justice Strider by Mr. Elliot Curren for the sum of \$25. After listening to the evidence Justice Strider gave judgment against Mr. Miller for the amount asked.
