IT'S AMANDA'S COURTHOUSE.
After a Bitter Fight Mrs. Way Wins a Famous Suit. Wichita, Kan., Jan. 12.—By a decision of the United States court here Mrs. Amanda Way of Boston will become sole owner of the Ellsworth county \$25,000 courthouse on March 1. The suit was one in equity. Mrs. Way claimed that inasmuch as her late husband owned the property on which the courthouse was built, and as he had furnished all the money to erect the building, she should be given the property. After a bitter fight lasting for three years she finally obtained judgment. The decree provides that she shall pay the county \$9,000 for the heating apparatus and fixtures in the building and then take everything on the property but the records, which the county will be permitted to keep. She has until March to raise the money.
