

SUICIDE OF HENRY WM. HERBERT.

Henry Wm. Herbert, a literary writer of some note, and favorably known by his signature of "Frank Forrester," committed suicide in New York a few days since.

When a man of genius and cultivated mind commits so desperate an act as to rush unprepared into the presence of his Supreme Judge, the spectacle not only appals us, but has a tendency to persuade those whose religious faith is not firmly grounded, that suicide may be allowable in some cases; especially in the unhappy man, in his last letter, professed faith in the Christian Redeemer.
