THE ARRIVAL OF ALEXANDER AT HIS CAPITAL.

Russia and Austria Believed to Be Acting in Concert--General Foreign Notes.

LONDON, September 1.--The Vienna Fremdenblatt, commenting on the North German Gazette's apparent insinuation that an understanding exists between Austria and Russia regarding their respective spheres in the Balkans, asserts emphatically that such an impression is erroneous. Both the Gazette and the Fremdenblatt's articles have caused a sensation. Dr. Windthorst, the German Chief leader, thinks that Prince Bismarck is doing all in his power to destroy his reputation as a great statesman.

BELIEVES IN PEACE.

ADVANCES FROM SOFIA.

Blyadoff organized a kneeling demonstration before the Consulate at Sofia to pray for the Czar's restoration, and it is reported that there is proof that he said to Zankoff two days before the revolution, "Your professions of fealty to Russia are all very well, but we now want acts."

Alexander's Restoration a Fair Accomplish.

VIENNA, September 1.--A rumor is current that the powers have agreed to Turkey that they accept a fair accomplishment, but that in the interest of European peace his return was undesirable.

Preparations to Give the Prince a Royal Welcome.

SOFIA, September 1.--Col. Mutkoff and his troops arrived yesterday and received an enthusiastic welcome. The city is calm. Preparations are being made for a joyful welcome to Prince Alexander. The arrest of plotters continues. A court martial is being formed, and will deal with the conspirators as early as possible. The Ministry continues to act at Tirnova. The King of Roumania has written to Alexander congratulating him upon his return.

Alexander Interviewed.

PARIS, September 1.--The Journal des Debats publishes an interview with Prince Alexander of Bulgaria, in which he declares that Bulgaria would resist any attempt on the part of Russia to occupy the country, and that the hostilities which would follow would compromise the pacific relations existing between the three empires.

Alexander Again at His Capital.

SOVIA, September 1.--Prince Alexander has arrived at his capital, Sofia, and his journey to Elena was marked by a series of popular ovations similar to those reported yesterday along the route from Systova to Tirnova.

FOREIGN MISCELLANY.

Dynamic Outrage in Liverpool. Liverpool, September 1.--Mrs. Hayes, a widow, was yesterday evening by her landlady, Mrs. Ryan, last night an iron tube filled with explosives, connected with a lighted fuse, was thrown into the residence of one of Mrs. Ryan's sons. The fuse was quenched before an explosion could occur, and no damage was done.

France and the Vatican.

PARIS, September 1.--The Pope has accepted France's proposal, the Mons. Agliardi, recently appointed by the Vatican Papal Nuncio at Peking, instead of going to China as nuncio, proceed thither to study conjointly with representatives of France and China the conditions for the eventual re-establishment of a nunciature in China.

Bill in France.

LONDON, September 1.--The report of the arrival of Sir Charles Dilke in Canada is declared to be untrue. It is said that he is still in France.

Attack on Soldiers at Arrah.

ARRAH, IRELAND, September 1.--A body of civilians today attacked a party of soldiers belonging to the Irish Fusiliers for using "disloyal" expressions, and compelled them to seek shelter in their barracks.

Anxiety at Belfast.

BELFAST, September 1.--The police have returned riot duty along the Shankill road. Crowds have assembled in different parts of the city. No disorders have yet taken place today, but considerable anxiety is felt as to the outcome of the night.

Deploable State of Affairs in Algeria.

ALGIER, September 1.--The military condition of Algeria is deplorable. There is apparently an utter absence of discipline among the troops. Duels take place almost daily between soldiers and officers, and even between rival companies of chasseurs and Zouaves. The native soldiers attack foreigners on the slightest provocation.

The Czar's New Title.

LONDON, September 1.--It is rumored that the Czar has abandoned his intention of going to Samarkand, and is to be crowned Emperor of Asia and will assume the title of Ukase.

Discussing Their Future Policy.

LONDON, September 1.--The disident Liberals are making arrangements to hold a meeting to discuss their future policy. Communes Led and Russell are urging to anti farmers and grieve purchasers to prepare as early as possible evidence which they wish to submit to the commission on Irish rents.

Christians Muzzered in China.

SHANGHAI, September 1.--Advisers from China Top Foo, the chief of the Province of Szechuen, state that the natives of the eastern part of that Province and these of Northern Cochinchina, have risen against the Christians and are massacring them and destroying their property. This active persecution is attributed to the imprudence of the English and American missionaries. In Cochinchina alone fifty Christians have been killed, their houses burned, and their farms destroyed. In Szechuen a general massacre of Christians is reported to be in progress and they are killed wherever found. It is said that whole villages occupied by Christians have

HOOVER'S TRIUMPH.

HE IS NOMINATED FOR CONGRESS FROM THE

Jackson District on the First Ballot Over Barksdale by a Very Decided Majority.

(SPECIAL TO THE APPEAL.)

JACKSON, Miss., September 1.--The nominating Congressional Convention was called to order promptly at 12 o'clock today, with full delegations from every county in the district. The contest commenced at once fierce and heavy on the temporary organization. W. C. Wilkinson, a Hooker delegate, was elected temporary chairman, and L. P. Childs and E. L. Martin secretaries, by a vote of 15 to 13.

The Clarkdale delegates contested every inch of ground, and were defeated on all preliminary questions by the same vote above.

The report of the Committee on Credentials unanimously recommended the seating of the Hooker delegates from the contest counties of Lincoln and Claiborne, which report was adopted.

This action gave Hooker nineteen delegates to thirteen for Maj. Barksdale.

The temporary organization was then declared permanent, and the nomination was then proceeded with.

Dr. Byron Lemly of Jackson, placed in nomination the Hon. C. E. Hooker of Hinds, which was seconded in an eloquent speech from Dr. Lockwood of Copah.

Mr. T. A. White of Rankin, placed in nomination the Hon. E. Barksdale of Hinds, which was seconded by Root. Power of Madison.

On a call of the counties the vote resulted in nineteen votes for Hooker and thirteen for Barksdale.

On motion of Mr. White the nomination was made unanimous.

The announcement of the result in a nearly wild vociferous and prolonged applause.

A committee was appointed to wait upon Col. Hooker and inform him of his nomination, and invite him to address the convention, which he did in a stirring address of some thirty minutes, accepting the nomination.

By invitation of the convention the Hon. E. Barksdale appeared and delivered a patriotic speech announcing his true loyalty to the party, and bowing and accepting with grace and dignity the decision of the convention and returned stainless and unswerving the banner of the party heretofore intrusted to him. His speech was received with great enthusiasm.

Mr. A. J. M. Laurin, of Rankin, offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we oppose all tariff legislation except a tariff for revenue only; that we favor the unlimited coinage of gold and silver; that we endorse the administration of President Cleveland.
