Mr. Henry F. Walsh has resigned his position as deputy clerk in the Chancery Court, and will devote himself to the practice of law. His years of close study in the Chancery Clerk's office will be of the greatest value to him, and, with his ambition, he is sure to take prominent rank at the bar.

Chancellor Ellett issued the following order yesterday: The Clerk and Master having, as required by law, made his report to this term stating the amount of money in his office and the cases to which the same belong, showing an aggregate amount of \$119,159.41 in his hands, it is ordered that the same be filed for the inspection of the court and of the attorneys, solicitors and parties interested; and it is further ordered that H. E. Goodlett, H. A. Hunter and W. J. Freeman be appointed to examine said report and money, to see that the same is correct in every respect, and that they make report thereof to this court. The Chancellor, as required by section 378 of the Code, having examined the bonds of the Clerk and Master, is satisfied that they are in conformity with law, and that the sureties on the same are good and solvent and worth the penalties of the bonds respectively, and accordingly directs this entry to be made in the minutes.

The recommendations of the Mississippi River Commission as to the expenditure of the river and harbor land for the lower Mississippi have been approved by the War Department, and forwarded to the officer in charge of that work. They approve of the proposed expenditure for the continuance of the work on the Memphis harbor. They recommend the beginning of work for the reclamation of the Red and Atchafalaya rivers, and the work of repairs to levees at Delta Point. They give \$40,000 for the construction of the Morgan levee, provided the State will assume the remainder, and also appropriate liberally for other work below Memphis. All the recommendations of the commission are approved by the War Department. Great satisfaction is felt among the friends of the levee system that work on the levees is to be thus begun.
