**Didn't Know It Was Loaded.**

Newport, Ark., May 1.—"I will shoot," said a young man to Jim White, a lad of thirteen years, last night, when, suiting the action to the word, he raised a double-barrel shotgun. As he did so the boy cried out, "Don't point that gun at me, it may be loaded." Hardly had the words escaped his lips when "pop" went the gun and the next instant the boy lay prostrated in mortal agony on the ground, with a heavy load of turkey shot in his body. He did not know the gun was loaded. The accident happened sixteen miles from Newport.

**A Big Fire in Chenoweth, Ill.**  
CHENOWETH, Ill., May 1.—A dispatch from Chenoweth, Ill., to the Daily News, says: At about 1 o'clock this morning a large two-story brick block in which about one-third of the business of Chenoweth was done took fire and was completely destroyed. The aggregate loss is \$75,000; the insurance \$35,000. The principal sufferer is William Failor, who conducted a general store. His loss \$35,000; his insurance \$7,000. Nickel & Sturtevant, hardware, loss \$10,000; insurance \$3,000. F. M. Quinn, express agent, and J. B. Lennox were injured by falling walls; the former, it is thought, fatally.

**A Strike That Affects 5,000 Men.**  
PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 1.—A general strike of the building trades was inaugurated today for an average advance of 25 cents a day and union workmen. Nearly all the carpenters, joiners, bricklayers, hod carriers and stone masons in the two cities are idle, and work has been suspended on almost every new building. The strike affects about 5,000 men.
