THE COSSITT LIBRARY.

INTERESTING MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Various Committees Made Up, and Work on the Institution to Begin at Once-The Entire Bequest to Go Into the Building and Grounds.

Memphis will have a public library building, that's certain, unless positive plans of good business men count for naught. Whether that library is properly stocked

rests with the good people of the city. A meeting of the Cossitt Library trustees was held yesterday morning at the office of Mr. Carrington Mason, secretary of the board. It was attended by all the members except Cols. W. M. Farrington and Napoleon Hill, who are absent from the city. The first business transacted was to organize under the charter, as the board of directors of the institution formally accept the bequest of Mr. Cossitt, and in due form elect the officers. As a result of the latter act Col. Farrington is now the permanent president, Mr. D. P. Hadden vice-president, Mr. Carrington Mason secretary and Mr. S. P. Read treas-

Chairmen of the respective committees submitted names of those to become their associates. On building, Chairman J. C. Neely designated Messrs. J. T. Fargason, Wm. M. Ranolph, W. M. Farrington and Carrington Mason. On library, Chairman Hadden named Messrs. Napoleon Hill and Elliston Mason. On ways and means, Chairman Fargason selected Messrs. J. C.

Neely and S. P. Read. It was then resolved that the entire bequest of \$75,000 should be expended on a library building and beautifying grounds. The directors reasoned in this wise: The amount on hand was from the munificent generosity of Mr. Cossitt. It was better, then, to erect something that would en-dure as a monument to that lamented dure as a monument to that lamented gentleman and public benefactor, and throw the responsibility for supplying its contents upon the people designed to be benefited. This building will be so constructed that, should the means ever present themselves, a music hall and art gallery may be added without in any way marring by alterations the original or incurring expense in such changes. To this end the committee will for some time receive plans and specifications from archiend the committee will for some time receive plans and specifications from architects, home and foreign, but only as a
gratuity. For such an institution they
confidently rely upon the public spirit of
local architects and the friendly disposition of those elsewhere. That this confidence is well bestowed Mr. Mason has already received plans from abroad, the
same as used in the construction of the
leading library buildings. In these contributions even the humblest architect is
permitted to freely submit his plans, a depermitted to freely submit his plans, a de-cision upon which will be made upon merit

The directors lost no time in adding as largely as practicable to the bequest of Mr. ossitt. As soon as it came to hand they placed it on deposit at handsome interest.
