SATH OF GEORGE SPLANE.

Well-Known Druggist Passes Away at an Early Hour This Morning—A Sketch of His Familiar Career... Mr. George R. Splane, who was one of the most widely-known druggists in this city, and whose store at the corner of Fifth and Smithfield streets is a recognized landmark, died at his home, No. 29 Bluff street, at 12:35 this morning. His death resulted from a complication of diseases. He became ill about four weeks ago, but recovered and was

George Splane, out for three days, when he also relapsed, and death resulted. Dr. Jones and McKelvey, the attending physicians, gave up all hope of his recovery a few days ago.

Mr. Splane was 47 years of age. He was born in Allegheny, in 1842, when 20 years of age, he enlisted in Company D, One Hundred and Twenty-third Pennsylvania Volunteers (Colonel Clark's regiment), for nine months' service. At the end of his term of enlistment he entered the naval department and served until the end of the war.

He then returned to Pittsburg, and was at first clerk on the old passenger steamer Juliet. Captain Russell, his uncle, commanded the boat. Mr. Splane owned a share in the steamer.

About 12 years ago he entered the drug business, and also managed his mother's estate, which amounted to \$500,000.

Mr. Splane was a prominent Mason, and a member of the American Club. He was a brother of Joseph Splane, Esq., and Charles Splane, the latter of the County Commission. His widow is a sister of W. C. Moreland, Esq., and a niece of W. D. Moore, Esq. He leaves, besides the widow, one child.

AN ORDINANCE—AMENDING AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE OPENING OF CLAWSON STREET, FROM GRAZIER STREET TO NORTH LINE OF PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD, APPROVED AUGUST 7, 1887. Section 1—Be it ordained and enacted by the City of Pittsburg, in Select and Common Councils assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the authority of the same, That the opening of Clawson street, from Grazier street to north line of the Pennsylvania Railroad, approved August 7, 1887, which reads as follows: An ordinance authorizing the opening of Clawson street, from Grazier street to north line of the Pennsylvania Railroad, at a width of 60 feet, in accordance with an ordinance locating the same, approved October 25, 1887. The damages caused thereby and the benefits to be assessed and collected in accordance with the provisions of an act of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act authorizing and directing Councils of cities of the second class to provide for the improvement of streets, lanes, alleys and public highways, sewers and sidewalks, requiring plans of streets, providing for the appointment of a Board of Viewers of Street Improvements, prescribing their duties, granting appeals to Councils and Court, providing for the assessment and collection of damages and benefits, authorizing the use of private property and providing for filing liens and regulating proceedings thereon, and prohibiting the use of public streets without authority of Councils," approved the 14th day of June, A.
