

SULLIVAN'S PRELIMINARY

The Alleged Head of the Plot to Murder Dr. Cronin Released on Bail.

DECISION OF THE JUDGE.

He Holds that the Evidence at the Inquest was Mainly Hearsay.

NO DIRECT TESTIMONY AGAINST HIM.

After Considerable Kicking the Amount of Bail was Fixed at \$20,000—Not Quite Three Days in Jail—The Work of Investigating Continued—The Grand Jury—Efforts to Secure the Surrender of Maroney and McDonald, the New York Prisoners—Other Suspects.

Alexander Sullivan is no longer confined in the murderer's row of the Chicago jail. His application for release on bail, made through a writ of habeas corpus, proved successful. Judge Jule holds that the evidence given before the coroner's jury was largely irrelevant. The amount of bail was fixed at \$20,000, which was promptly furnished. The grand jury pursued its work of investigation without any further sensational developments.

CHICAGO, June 14.—Alexander Sullivan has been restored to liberty by Judge Jule. The release was the immediate result of Sullivan's application for a writ of habeas corpus. Bail was fixed at \$20,000, and was promptly furnished by four well-known citizens, each of whom represented many times the total amount asked. Mr. Sullivan walked out of court after having been less than three days in custody. The judge held that the coroner's jury had been influenced by hearsay evidence, in which he charged that he was an enemy of Sullivan.
