Put Out in the Nick of Time

FRANKLIN, August 1.—Providence interfered and prevented a great fire at the Eclipse Oil Works last night. During a rain storm lightning struck tank No. 150, containing 3,000 barrels of oil. An explosion followed, and the top of the tank was sent up into the air 50 feet. The oil in the tank took fire, but the top of the tank came down and alighted on the tank in such a manner as to smother the flames.

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CHICAGO'S AMBITION

They Are Bound to Have the World's Fair if Work Will Get It. CHICAGO, August 1.—The Chicago World's Fair committee held a meeting this afternoon to decide ways and means of securing the coveted location of the World's Fair at Chicago. Mayor Cregier was elected Chairman, and Thomas C. O'Neill Secretary. Over 200 leading citizens and millionaires of Chicago were in attendance, and the meeting was a most enthusiastic one. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED

Resolved, That whereas the recent Centennial celebration in New York received very proper and with Chicago's hearty concurrence—the distinct recognition of Congress, and of the chief officers of the Government, imparting to it a national character, and a like recognition and substantial aid having been extended to the World's Fair in Philadelphia—also with Chicago's cordial co-operation in and out of Congress—therefore the West feels justified in insisting upon its turn now, and upon the location of the next great fair in its commercial metropolis.

AN EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Consisting of 35 of the leading citizens of Chicago, was appointed. Governor Fifer and Senator Callahan were added to the General Committee, and the Mayor was also authorized to add to the General Committee representatives of the cities of the Western and Northwestern States in the ratio of not exceeding one for each 10,000 population.
