Musicians Form an Assembly of the Knights of Labor. EFFECT OF THE NEW DEPARTMENT. A Permanent Professional Orchestra to be Organized.

GOSSIP ABOUT OUR LOCAL MUSICIANS.

As announced exclusively in THE DISPATCH yesterday morning, the Knights of Labor charter was granted to Musical Assembly No. 1283. The charter members comprise a dozen or so of Pittsburgh's orchestral players, mostly members of the Allegheny County Musicians' Union.

At the first meeting under the new charter, to be held this afternoon, many more A. C. M. U. men are to be admitted, and it is expected that very soon the membership of the two bodies will be practically identical, though the organizations will remain separate.

While it is gratifying to note that, in making this move, the A. C. M. U. men have not abandoned the wise and prudent principles for which they have so long contended, it is to be deeply regretted that they have sought to escape from a few temporary difficulties by attaching themselves to the authority of an organization in whose interests, aims, occupations, conflicts and membership they have no real and permanent concern.

For the principles and aims of the Knights of Labor, as voiced by G. M. W. Powerly, the writer has unfeigned respect and sympathy; but he would be likely to rise in the next meeting of the Bar Association or of the Art Society to move that those bodies apply for a K. of L. charter as to favor the entrance of the professional musicians, as such, into the K. of L.

Such considerations should suffice even were there no higher point of view from which to regard the musical calling. But it is not a trade. It is a profession, by virtue both of the vitally important personal element in it and also of its great exaltedness in the eyes of the community.

Some of the points in the program of the new organization are: to secure the best of the individual abilities of each man in the most important (one poor player spoiling the work of all beside him) a trade wherein, —because of this all-important personal element, the limited number of players and the irregularity and variety of engagements —it is impossible to apply an absolute scale of wages, impracticable to adjust to strikes or other movements of the members as a whole, inconceivable in every way to use the K. of L. machinery in advancing the interests of the members, jointly or severally.
