James Neff Again on Trial for Complicity in McCausland's Murder.

COLUMBUS, November 18.—John McBride, President of the Progressive Union of Miners and Mine Laborers, to-day issued the following call:

The miners of Northern Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia, whose coal goes into Western and Northwestern markets, are notified that a convention of this competitive district will be held in Indianapolis, Wednesday, December 16, 1920.

The joint convention of operators and miners for the adjustment of mining rates in this district will be held at the same place and time.

NEFF'S SECOND TRIAL BEGUN.

Opening of the Case Against the Alleged McCausland Murderer's Accomplice.

WASHINGTON, Pa., November 18.—James Neff is now on trial here for complicity in the murder of William McCausland, a drover of Allegheny City, in Cumberland township, Greene county, on the 10th of September, 1887.

George Clark, son of Zach Taylor, residing in the neighborhood of the scene of the murder, stand convicted of the crime. The date for George Clark's execution has been set several times, and unless another respite is granted, he will be hanged December 18.

Both the Supreme Court and the Pardons Board have refused to interfere in his behalf.

Neff, the defendant in the case now on trial, but a new trial and a change of venue to this place were granted by Judge Ingraham.

The case was called at 1 o'clock this afternoon, and when court opened at 2 o'clock the 80 jurymen had been examined. Five of them were selected, as follows: Peter K. Means, farmer, Peter's farm, B. A. Scott, merchant, Independence; John S. Wilson, carriage maker, Washington; E. C. Furlong, coal operator, Allen township; William Grimes, farmer, West Pike Run.

Eight were stood aside by the Commonwealth, and the remaining 72 were sworn in.

P. Hiss, District Attorney of Greene county; J. F. Taylor, District Attorney of Washington county, and J. P. Anderson, of Youngstown, O., and R. F. Downey, of Greene county; Captain Duveroy, of the Wheeling Bar, and M. L. A. McCracken, of Washington. There are 75 witnesses to be heard, 40 for the Commonwealth and the remainder for the defense.

DISBURSING RELIEF MONEY.

Secretary Kremer Paying Claims Rapidly—Shortage of Natural Gas.

JOHNSTOWN, November 18.—The mailing of checks went on rapidly to-day, and it looks as if Secretary Kremer would be able to keep his promise to have the money all paid out in ten days.

No one whose loss is over \$2,000 has yet received the full amount proportioned out to him, in some cases where the claimant is sick or dependent he has received several hundred dollars.

The Johnson Company, manufacturers of steel and iron pipes, is being investigated for fuel made by what is known as the Archer process.

Two producers are now in use, and two more are being put into operation. The process is a complete success, producing cheap and pure natural gas.

The shortage in the supply of natural gas has caused the Cambria Iron Company to return to coal in firing the boilers in the Gantt department.

A POSSIBLE CLUE.

The Finding of a Bench of Hair May Yet Reveal a Crime.

The entire town is excited and the river will be thoroughly draged.

FACTION IN RELIGION.

Jeanette Catholics Divided Over the Name of the New Church.

There is liable to be a split in the Catholic congregation at Jeanette. The new town can boast of 400 Catholic families who have been drawn there by the glass factories.

They have been worshipping in Greensburg and other nearby places for some time, and have come to the conclusion that a church is necessary.

Sometimes ago a committee from the Southside went there to work up interest in the St. Michael's church, but the people of the town, Michael Burton and Albert St. Peters, who are willing to make large contributions on condition that Mr. Burton wains the church called St. Michael's and the other man declares it should be named St. Peter's.

The reasons in both cases are quite apparent. The controversy has developed to such an extent as to become factional.

Finally Mr. Burton put up \$5,000 and started to build a church. Mr. St. Peters says he will bring influence to bear so that the Bishop will not receive and consecrate it.

Mr. Burton retorts that he doesn't care what is done. He proposes to erect a St. Michael's Church at all hazards, even if he has to make a donation of the building to the people as a town hall.

ANDREW JACKMAN BURIED.

Rev. Father Wall Preached the Funeral Sermon.

The entire town of Allegheny, Pa. was held yesterday forenoon. At the residence, No. 436 Penn avenue, the face was exposed to the view of friends until 9:30 o'clock.

The body was then conveyed to St. Paul's Church, where the funeral services were held at 10 o'clock.

Bearers were W. A. Heron, Henry G. Hale, L. Glesenkamp, Charles Arbutnot, E. L. Bing, James Verner, James R. Badin, Joshua Rhodes, Bernard Rafferty and Henry Hayes.

At the Catholic church the requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Wall, assisted by Fathers Conway and Molyneux, and Father Wall spoke a few words about the deceased. The body was buried in St. Mary's Cemetery.
