

WEST AGAINST EAST.

The Speakership Fight Developing a Rather Sectional Feeling. MORE CONFUSION COMES TO LIGHT.

A Hard Matter to Guess Who Will Gain by About a Score of Members.

FAILING TO ATTEND THE CAUCUS.

FROM A STAFF CORRESPONDENT. WASHINGTON, November 26. The friends of McKinley admit today that Reed will have about 65 votes on the first ballot; but they say they are still more certain that he cannot get the other 20 necessary for a nomination; that is, provided every Republican member is in attendance at the caucus. The prospects are now that the caucus will not have anything like the full vote of 109, and this tends to confuse the already much confused situation. At least a dozen members have been heard from who say they do not think they can get here in season for the caucus, and it is probable the 21 members are sufficient to make 18 or 20 absentees.

Just whom this will help, and whom it will hurt, cannot yet be figured out. The Reed men think they will have the caucus, no matter how many may be absent. But if only 100 members are present, it will require but 70 votes to nominate, and thus the question of absenteeism is a very serious one.

DEVELOPMENTS OF A DAY. It appeared more to-day than at any previous time that Reed will have virtually the solid delegation of New York and Pennsylvania. Eighteen of the 19 New York Republicans, and 16 of the 21 Pennsylvania delegates is the minimum admitted by the adherents of Reed, and more than one of McKinley's friends confessed that it looked very much that way. Others of them, however, would not allow Reed more than 16 from New York and 11 from Pennsylvania. The information is, however, that Reed will have 18 from New York and 17 from Pennsylvania, and that he will have 19 from New York and 18 from Pennsylvania. Osborne and Seal are the only two members who are believed to be entirely beyond the pale of conversion to the Reed side of the dispute. Kelly, Harner and Kelly are the three others counted as possibly for McKinley, though General Bingham asserts that Harner and Kelly will certainly be for Reed. It was asserted by high authority today that Reed had received a letter from Kelly pledging his support.

THE OPPOSING SECTIONS. Far from being dismayed at the large vote from New England, New York and Pennsylvania (New England giving 25), Mr. McKinley and his friends gather hope from the fact that the contest is made more sectional thereby, and tremendous efforts are now being made by them to draw the line against the rule of this compact and dominating East, and elect a man whose character will be the highest expression of the boundaries and unbalanced West. Mr. McKinley's friends assert that only 7 Western voters are pledged for Reed, and that they will yet take these away from him before the noon of Saturday. Representative Perkins, of Kansas, is one of those Western voters, and he was reported today to have pledged to either Henderson or Cannon. When THE DISPATCH correspondent questioned him in regard to the report, he declared that he was for Reed first, last and all the time, and that he would get 3, and possibly 4, of the 7 votes from Kansas, Uncle Joe Cannon speaking in the rest.

THE LESSER LIGHTS. Henderson will have Iowa and a few scattered votes, in all probably 15 or 18. But rows will have Michigan and a few outside, probably 12 all told. Cannon, by sheer force of hand work, has drummed up probably 28 or 29. This is the largest vote of any one of the Western candidates to nominate McKinley on the first vote, and it is not likely that they have good reason to-day to think they can hold the West solid against Reed, with the exception of the probably 10 or 12 now pledged to Reed.

HOW A CLAIM IS SMASHED. There is no truth in the story, though undoubtedly a great number of Reed's adherents are for McKinley for second choice, and prefer E. J. Kelly because they think he is more experienced and would be a more successful party speaker at critical moments. "Jim" Belden, the New York Congressman from the Syracuse district, arrived last night, and added his valiant efforts to those of Bayne, Daniels, Lodge and Farquar in support of Reed. It is a strong team. McKinley's chief adherents are that brilliant Ohio trio, Butterworth, Grosvenor and Thompson, and they are as good as the most earnest candidate could ask. The cause of McKinley will not suffer from this management.

THAT NEW STEEL WIRE COMBINE. Men From East and West Assembled in This City Yesterday. A number of gentlemen interested in the operations of the lately organized steel wire combine were in the city yesterday. Among them were observed Messrs. Hilday, of San Francisco; Geo. S. Douglas, of New York; J. W. Gates, of St. Louis; Marshall, of Omaha, and Fitch, of Bradock. A meeting was held at which further arrangements for bringing manufacturing concerns into the combine were discussed. The result will be that every shop in the city will have its particular chapel banner.

The report was approved and the Executive Committee authorized to substitute new names on the committees for any who may decline to serve. In response to a motion to effect a permanent local organization, Messrs. W. C. Lilly, Fred Kiefer and S. W. Hay were appointed a committee to draft a report. After some remarks the committee came in. The report of the committee, as presented, fixed the time of the organization as the Allegheny County Sunday School Association. The object is the promotion of Sunday-school work in this county by conventions, institutes and other means.

The basis of representation is one delegate for every Sunday school, and one additional for every 100 over the first 100. An executive committee of nine members was provided for, and the association will meet at least once a year. Special session of Mr. Corde, he, W. C. Lilly, J. H. Baldwin, L. T. Yoder and Robert Day were appointed a committee to nominate officers for the association and the next meeting, when the organization will be perfected.

Before adjourning the Secretary read a letter received from Mr. E. F. Jacobs, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the International Convention, acknowledging receipt of the invitation to hold the convention in Pittsburgh. He said that he would consult with the other members of the Executive Committee and see how far the convention will be held. It would probably be held, in July.
