WYANESBURG, PA., March 19.—Zack Taylor, the condemned murderer who is to hang April 9, still remains downhearted. He is quite a changed man since the execution of George Clark. He was very boisterous before, even up to the night before the execution, talking, swearing and acting as though nothing of importance was near at hand. Since, however, he has quieted down, and is very melancholy.

A REMARKABLE MISSTIVE.

Oil City, Pa., March 19, 1890. Sir: For my crime another shall not suffer and pay the penalty, bear up under the disgrace and pass through this world with a stain upon his name that never can be washed out. No, a thousand times no. (God knows I did not mean to harm him, for I am only a weak woman. But he accomplished his crime by killing me first, and I killed him, but God knows I did not do it on purpose. Zack Taylor is innocent. So release him at once, I will sign my name, and if the others find me I will not recede, but I will not come and confess my guilt. With easy heart and mind I will sign my name.

TAYLOR IS INDISCREET.

Taylor is not as firm as Clark was and is not as discreet. Several damaging statements that he had made were proven on his trial, showing his connection with the crime. At different times since his imprisonment he has dropped things, and Clark carried them round several times for him. At one time when Rev. Maxwell called on the prisoners, Taylor said: "I have something to tell you," and they looked off to one side of the jail. Clark followed them and Taylor never told what he desired. Taylor has always laughed at the ministers calling, and he has never said a word in a future state. He wrote to Rev. Maxwell this week, however, asking him to be with him on the day of his execution. He said he would like to see Ben Clark, who was convicted as one of the accomplices in the murder of William McCausland and was released from jail on \$5,000 bond for his appearance, his father, Frank Clark, Sr., being his bondsman.

DEVELOPING VIRGINIA.

Capitalists Make a Large Purchase of Productive Iron Lands. GREENSBRIER WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, Va., March 19.—An iron mining company, one of the largest in the Eastern States, was organized at Covington, Allegheny county, Va., a few days ago, with a capital stock of \$200,000 to open up and develop the rich iron fields of this State. This land, consisting of 3,300 acres, below Covington, and adjoining the property of the Lowmeyer Company, has been acquired at a cost of \$150,000. It is under a vast amount of iron ore possessing rich veins and is the opinion of the geologists that 800,000 tons can be mined a day for a century, without exhausting the supply. Dr. Shannahan, of Louisville, Ky., the head of the company, is president, with E. M. Nettleton, of Covington, as Secretary and Treasurer, and a long list of wealthy and prominent stockholders.

YOUNGSTOWN'S DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

William J. Lowthers Suggested as a Candidate for Mayor. YOUNGSTOWN, March 19.—The Democratic primaries for the nomination of a ticket for which a ticket will be selected next Saturday, were held last evening at the rooms of the Jefferson Club. The only announcement for Mayor was the name of William J. Lowthers, who was Mayor of the city for two terms and earned an excellent record. He has not been a candidate for the Mayorship this year, and said this afternoon that he had not decided whether he would now allow his name to be used.

The Chicago Board of Trade Determined to Kill Off the Bucket Stock. CHICAGO, March 19.—The Chicago Board of Trade presented to Judge Wiley today a motion to have the injunctions standing against it modified so that it will not be punished for contempt of court if it puts in effect March 31 its recently adopted resolution to discharge together on that date the bucket stock of all kinds to anybody. This is the latest step in the fight to kill off the bucket stock, which has been pending for several months before Judges Tilden, Collins and Hart on Friday.

Eight K. of L. Districts Created in the Coke Region. The object is to diminish the work of Master Workman Kerfoot and Secretary Parker.

SHORTER HOURS FOR WORKERS.

A Part of the Demands of Striking Shirt Makers. NEW YORK, March 19.—The committee of the Operative's Union and the Contractors' Association, appointed to settle the dispute between the shirt manufacturers and striking employees, came to a partial agreement today. The operative's demands were: Increase of wages of 10 per cent for workers on foot-power machines, and 10 per cent for steam-power operatives, contractors to supply their own machines; not more than ten hours a day's work; weekly payment of union hands to be employed; agreement to be signed by the contractors that they could not accept the first demand until they themselves received more pay from the warehousemen.
