WILDWOOD FIELD.

SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH. WILDWOOD, September 14.—The acquisition of several large wells in the Wildwood territory during the past week has given the field a wide reputation and is attracting considerable attention from the trade in general.

NEW GRAY SAND DISTRICT.

FRANKLIN.—The recent gray sand developments at the mouth of Two Mile Run, two miles up the Allegheny river from Franklin, Pa., have awakened some interests among the producers of the New River and Frankfort fields.

AN INTERESTING POINT.

The Patterson, Griffith and Miller well on the Macke is now one of the most interesting points of the field. This well has been reported in the sand and showing oil, through the sand and dry, while another report was current that it was drilled below the level of the Wildwood oil horizon.

WELLS LOCATED.

GREENLEE AND FORT NO. 4, Rolhouse, which are 1 1/2 miles apart, are 75 barrels an hour on the go off and showing oil in the barrels an hour. The same parties tapped the No. 2 at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

OPERATIONS AND PRODUCTION.

The Forest Oil Company have located No. 2 rig on the Macke, a short distance from the corner of the creek from No. 1. Griffith and Miller, on the Ringstein farm, are down 1,300 feet with their No. 1. Pinegas and Walnut are now producing from the Wallace farm, one half mile southwest from the Ringstein farm.
