Wonders of the Phipps Collection in Carnegie Library.

ONE PUBLISHED 300 YEARS AGO.

Odd Illustrations in One of the Very Old Publications.

GEMS GATHERED BY PROFESSOR BLAKE

The Phipps scientific collection, purchased with the \$10,000 donation from Henry Phipps, Jr., is coming into the Allegheny Carnegie Library at the rate of about 1,000 volumes a month.

Among the valuable works in the Blake collection is Dinzler's Polytechnical Journal complete, something very hard to get, and especially valuable to patent solicitors.

Wonders from the Blake Library. Other works issued by the Government and collected by Prof. Blake are full geological reports of the different States and works on metallurgy.

The oldest book in the library is found in this collection. It is printed in black letter German type, and was published in 1557 by Jerome Froben at Basel, Switzerland.

One peculiar feature is that of a picture, whether of a mine pit, a blacksmith shop or a furnace, has a number of birds either flying through the air, in cages or perched on a roof or tree-top.

The only picture that could be used in a nineteenth century book is that of a blacksmith shop. The tools are almost identical with those used now, and reflect and discredit on the progress of the brassy smith.

Another book of almost equal curiosity is a work on metals, published in 1561 by George Bower. It is still considered authoritative.
