

WALKING A FIGHT, THE CONTROLLER OBJECTS TO PAYING THE CLAIM FOR INTEREST IN A SUIT

OVER A SEWER CONTRACT. A TEST CASE WILL BE MADE OF IT, WHICH, IF LOST, WILL MEAN A QUARTER OF A MILLION OUTLAY

NOT COLLECTED FROM THE BENEFITED PROPERTY OWNERS. BOTH PARTIES WILL CONTEST HOTLY

The city will contest the claim of Contractor E. J. McVaine. There are no objections to his claim for money due on his contract, but there is decided opposition to paying interest on the amount during the two years the law allows after the completion of the work before payment can be forced.

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Chief Marshal William T. Kerr, of the Junior Order United American Mechanics, has completed all his arrangements for the big parade of the members of the order on Washington's Birthday. Yesterday he issued his final orders, detailing all arrangements.

THE CONTROLLER NOT FRIGHTENED. Controller Morrow is not at all fearful of the result of the suit. He said yesterday: "We will not contest the claim for money due on the contract. The court has decided that the suit must be dismissed within two years after the completion of the work. This time has passed and we are willing to pay Mr. McVaine the contract price. But we will fight the claim for interest. It is an unjust one and would cause the outlay of a large sum of money. If we had to pay interest to one contractor we would have to pay it to all."

PERMANENT ORGANIZATION EFFECTED. An adjourned meeting of the Democrats of the Thirty-fifth ward was held last night in the Luckey school.
