The Baroness de Rognes is still trying to get her daughter, Mrs. Maybrick, out of the English prison.

Nineteen vessels and 35 lives were lost during the gale of October 19 on the coast of Newfoundland.

The first natural gas explosion in Chicago Thursday night broke every window for a block in all directions.

General Sherman's home in St. Louis has been purchased by E. Drew, the plate glass manufacturer, for \$150,000.

The financially embarrassed postmaster of Hope, Kan., S. M. Teats, shot himself dead because he feared the loss of his position.

During an election riot at Big Rock Creek, N. C., 20 men were wounded and four will probably die. Knives were used as weapons.

A freight train derailed into a passenger train at Pleasant Hill, Mo., Thursday night on the Missouri Pacific. Many persons were injured.

At the request of the American Naval Department, specimens of all the various Russian naval uniforms have been sent from Petersburg to Washington.

Two of the largest packing concerns in Chicago have combined, and may also absorb the Hammond company. They are the International and Chicago companies.

Rev. John Fay, priest of the parish of Summerhill, Ireland, has been sentenced to one month's imprisonment. Father Fay in a recent sermon had assailed the Fenianists severely.

Allison, Shafer & Co., a general contracting firm doing a large amount of work for the city of St. Louis, was sold Thursday for \$200,000 by the Western National Bank of New York.
