

New York Markets, Dec. 20.

FLOUR—Holders of Western and State Flour manifest increased firmness. The cold weather imparts strength to the market, and the arrivals are not so large. The better grades of extras are quiet held at extreme rates.

GRAIN.—Wheat is quite firm, the inquiry moderate. Sales of good Michigan white, at \$2 20, and rate Southern at \$2 10 per bushel. Rye is less abundant at \$1 40 per bushel. Oats are still freely dealt in at 55c and 58c for State and Western.

PROVISIONS.—Mess Pork \$12 75, Prime \$12 25, Lard 10c and 10 1/2c per lb. Beef at \$10 50 to \$11 for Country prime to mess, and \$15 to \$16 for extra Chicago re-packed mess.


