POWDER MILL BLOWN UP.—The drying house and magazine belonging to Messrs. Rind & Co., powder manufacturers, Bankville, four miles east of Carbondale, were both blown up on Monday evening last at half-past six o'clock. We learn that some forty tons of powder were deposited in the two buildings. The casualty occurred while the employees all were at tea and fortunately no one was killed. The explosion of the two buildings, although some distance apart, was almost simultaneous. The casualty occurred while the seven miles was almost deafening, and the shock was very violent. We learn that it was likewise felt at Tunkhannock, Wilkes-Barre, and other places distant thirty or forty miles. We have been unable to ascertain the amount of the loss.—Seren to Register.

The force of the above explosion was distinctly felt in this vicinity, and various conjectures indulged in as to its cause. On Hollow Hill, three miles from this place, the windows in dwellings were so violently shaken, as to excite apprehensions of an earthquake. The flash of the explosion was also distinctly seen at this place.

ENCOUNTER WITH A BECK.—One day last week, DANIEL L. JENKS, Esq., was attacked by a large Beck owned by J. E. Bezes, which had straggled away and emerged from the woods on the hill near Mr. Jenks' house. The latter recognizing him, attempted to coax him near the house for the purpose of feeding him, when the animal made a sudden attack and came very near killing Mr. Jenks, the struggle lasting over a quarter of an hour, when Mr. Jenks was relieved from his perilous situation by the assistance of Mrs. Jenks and Mrs. Cable, who succeeded in getting a rope around the Beck's neck and choking him until he gave up the contest and galloped off into the woods.—Mr. Jenks sustained considerable injury in one of his hands and on different parts of his body. The Beck was subsequently pursued and shot by some of Mr. Jenks' neighbors.—Owego Gazette.

ITEMS FROM THE TOGA COUNTY AGITATOR.—An accident.—We learn that as some parties were running a log-train on the Toga R. R. between Toga Center and Corning, on Sunday, they ran into a lumber train standing on the track, throwing 16 men to the ground, and killing one man and wounding two or three others. All the Monday morning trains were detained in consequence.

THE CHATHAM.—We learn that the dwelling of Wm. W. Chatham, of Chatham, was destroyed by fire on the 26th ult. The loss falls heavily upon a laboring man, and no doubt the hand of aid will be extended by his neighbors.

CATTLE DISEASE.—Isolated cases of a disease similar to rinderpest, but somewhat more rapid in its course, has appeared in Chatham. Some fear that it is the Rinderpest. Probably it is only a violent form of rinderpest. It is to be hoped that it will not become epidemic. Whenever an animal is attacked the owner should kill it at once and bury it deep. This may save thousands of dollars to cattle owners.

HORNED AND FATAL ACCIDENT.—One of the most painful accidents that ever occurred in our city, took place at the house of EDWARD LYON, on Saturday evening. A lady of the house had gone to the basement to see to the fire in the furnace, when a young girl, Miss Mary Bussler, aged about 15 years, followed her to get a bottle of oil, by some accident, the dress of one or the other caught on a poker which was hanging up, when it struck a glass kerosene lamp, in the hands of Miss Bussler, which broke and poured the contents over the dress of the unfortunate girl, and she was on fire in a moment. She became very much frightened and ran up the stairs screaming for help. One of the ladies was severely burned in her efforts to extinguish the flames, without effect. Mr. FRANK CAMPBELL, in passing, heard the screams and, thinking the house on fire, went in, and found Packer arriving about the same time, they succeeded in smothering the flames; but the poor girl's clothes were almost wholly burned from her body, and the flesh on her arms and body burned black. She lingered in great agony until Sunday, about 1 o'clock, when death put an end to her suffering. Her parents reside near Hughesville.—Towanda Bulletin.
