

THE LEGISLATURE. Richmond, March 24, 1871. Senate.

Mr. Waddell in the chair. The remainder of the session of the Senate was occupied principally in the second reading of bills.

BILLS PASSED. The bill appropriating the public revenue for the fiscal year 1870-71, was passed. Incorporating the Southern Protection Insurance company of Alexandria.

Incorporating the town of Strasburg, in the county of Shenandoah. Incorporating the Pennsylvania and Potomac railroad company.

To authorize the trustees of Staunton to sell a certain lot of land. Authorizing the Judge of Campbell county to order a new election in Brookville township.

Amending the charter of the town of Scottsville. CHARTER OF RICHMOND. Senate bill, with House amendments, amending the charter of the city of Richmond was taken up, and amendments agreed to.

THE MILITIA BILL. Mr. Grimesley, from the committee of conference on the disagreement of the two Houses on the militia bill, made a report recommending the Senate to agree to the House substitute.

BILLS INTRODUCED. By Mr. Roler.—To prescribe the duties and powers of the superintendent of the poor and surities of the Gloucester Charity school. By Mr. Snowden.—Appointing trustees for the town of York, in the county of York.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION. Mr. Pendleton offered a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution by striking out the 24 section and inserting the following: "The House of Delegates shall be elected biennially by the voters of the several cities and counties, on the second Tuesday in October, and shall be distributed and apportioned as follows," &c.

House of Delegates. House met at 10 A. M. Speaker Turner in the chair. UNDER A SUSPENSION OF THE RULES the following bills were placed on the calendar without reference to a committee: House engrossed bill with Senate amendments—to amend the code concerning warrants of small claims; to allow further title to the owners of certain lots of land in Columbia, Fincastle county, to build on the same.

Senate bills to amend the act prescribing the duties and compensation of township officers in relation to collectors; to amend the acts of 1866 and '67 so as to provide for the payment of interest on the Dawson fund; to amend the act to incorporate the Piedmont and Potomac railroad company.

A COMMITTEE OF CONFERENCE was ordered to settle the difference between the two Houses as to House engrossed bill for the payment of per diem and expenses due the commissioners appointed for the sale and removal of the penitentiary.

REPORTED. Senate joint resolution for the purchase by the State of Elder's portrait of General Lee, was reported, with a recommendation that it do not pass. Senate bill: to amend an act incorporating the town of Powelltown, Amherst county.

House bills: to amend the code in regard to the Supreme Court of Appeals, (with a recommendation that it do not pass); to authorize the county court of New Kent to rescind an order heretofore made by said court in regard to fences.

ABOUT ADJOURNMENT. Mr. Keyser offered a joint resolution that the General Assembly shall adjourn on Wednesday, the 28th of March, which was rejected.

A resolution by Mr. Edmondson, doing away with to-night's (Friday's) session, was also rejected. THE PUBLIC DEBT. Senate bill to provide for the funding and payment of the public debt of the State, came up, as the special continuing order—the question being on the adoption of the amendment proposed by Mr. Woodson, to strike out all after the enacting clause to the section providing for a sinking fund, &c. which amendment, after some debate, was rejected.

The bill was being still discussed as we close. MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT. HE ASKS FOR MORE POWER IN THE SOUTHERN STATES. The President yesterday sent the following message to Congress: "A condition of affairs now exists in some of the States of the Union rendering life and property insecure, and the carrying of the mails and collection of the revenues dangerous. Proof that such a condition of affairs exists is now before the Senate. That power to correct these evils is beyond the control of the State authorities I have no doubt. The power of the Executive of the United States, acting within the limits of existing laws, is sufficient for present emergencies is not clear, therefore, I urge the passage of legislation in the judgment of Congress shall effectively secure life, liberty and property, and the enforcement of the law in all parts of the United States."

It may be expedient to provide that such law shall be passed in pursuance of this recommendation shall expire at the end of the next session of Congress. There is no other subject in which I would recommend legislation during the present session. U. S. GRANT. A RESPONSE TO THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE. Mr. Pomeroy, of Kansas, introduced a bill, which, after describing the condition of affairs alleged to exist in some parts of the South, concludes: "The President is hereby authorized, if convinced by a majority of the Senate, and with the discretion to issue a proclamation directing martial law to be in force in such specified county, or district of country, and, in addition to the militia force provided for in said act of 1795, he is authorized to employ the army and navy of the United States to suppress any resistance to the laws of the United States, and to bring to trial any person who is guilty of any crime against the United States, or against any citizen thereof, who by the laws and constitution of the United States is entitled to the free and equal protection of the laws. All such persons are to be tried, and, if convicted, punished according to the rules and articles of war, and the President is authorized to suspend the writ of habeas corpus in such districts for the time being, reporting his action to Congress at the next ensuing session of Congress."

HOUSE.—A resolution that the House shall adjourn on Monday next until December, was passed—yeas 112; nays 96. The President's message was read and referred, after a sharp debate, to a committee of five, as follows: Shellbarger, Butler, of Massachusetts; Scodd, Daver, Blair, of Michigan; Thomas, Morgan, Kerr, and Whitehouse.
