To OUR REPUBLICAN FRIENDS .- We are in receipt daily, from all sections of the State, of letters from different persons, recommending their friends as proper persons to represent the party in the next Legislature. It is impossible to publish them all; for our paper would be filled with such matter alone, if we did so. Besides, we propose not to recommend any man for office until by party action, he shall be selected; then, we may be counted upon to do our best for his election. We make this explanation to satisfy those whose articles we refuse to publish.

THE Democratic politicians of Tennes see begin to realize the necessity of putting an end to Ku-Kluxism, and in one of the districts have resolved to organize themselves into a posse comitatus, to be ready at the call of the United States marshal or sheriff, to arrest and bring to justice any persons violating the provisions of the Ku-Klux act in Tennessee, and binding themselves to pursue with the "hue and cry" the offender beyond the confines of the district. They also offer a standing reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of every offender in the civil district, and request the Democrats of other counties to organize similar clubs under these resolutions. This action, though perhaps having no higher motive than partisan success, is in every way commendable and it is to be hoped that its influence may be generally felt.

WHEN Dr. Livingstone gets home from -we do not exactly know where-it is "25 days' journey south of Ujiji"-he will find, we are told, not less than seventeen decorations, orders of nobility, knighthood, &c., awaiting him-the honors awarded by various European governments to this plucky and benevolent man. Whatever he may be authorized to wear on the outside of his coat, he will carry a stout heart within it worth all the ribands, red, white, or blue, and all the jewels of whatever water in the world. Dr. Livingstone's geographical discoveries are brilliant enough to blind most of us to the moral purpose of enterprises having for their main object the elevation of savage races.

THE good Mr. Emerson has met with something in California which has made him mildly dubious of one branch at least of his own philosophy. To a friend who hoped that he was not disappointed by the Yo-Semite Valley, he replied: "No, no; it is the only thing that quite comes up to the brag.' Mr. Emerson, we believe, was once theoretically of the opinion that a man would not find anything abroad which he might not have found at home. although practically Mr. E. has been given to what the old lady in Dickens' novel called "meandering." But the Yo-Semite, we are obliged to believe, is beautiful enough to disturb any mild, stay-at-home the world worth the trouble of a journey to look upon.

THE leading members of the Paris Commune do not appear to have been above using their late opportunities for getting money. The snug sum of a million and a half of francs is said to have been found upon the person of one Communal officer while upon the corpse of a Minister money to the amount of 409,000 francs was discovered. Doubtless many of the leaders hoped, after filling their purses, to go into comfortable exile somewhere beyond the reach of the government arm, but they have found that arm more potent and pitiless than they imagined, and instead of escaping to live at ease, they die ignominiously, leaving their plunder to testify against them.

A WRITER in the Boston Advertiser makes a suggestion which is worthy of consideration. It is that each city and large town, either by a payment once for all, or by an annual appropriation, should establish scholarships in our colleges free to one or more of its most deserving pupils. The expense would be small, but the plan would have a quickening influence upon the entire body of pupils in any municipality. Scores of meritorious young men might in this way obtain liberal education, which otherwise they will be unable to acquire.

THE present year promises to be one of unusual activity in the insect world. The locust in the North, the Hessian fly in Southern wheat fields, the chinch-bug in the far West, and the poisonous potatobug almost all over the country, will do immense damage. Their appearance in such unwonted numbers is supposed to be due to the greater heat of last year, and the deficient rainfall, which was scarcely more than three-fourths of the average all over the world.

A mass meeting, under the auspices of the Irish Democratic Union, has been held in the Cooper Institute, New York, "to repudiate the action of the adminis--tration in confirming the treaty of the Joint High Commission." Anthony A. Griffin presided, and after a few remarks, introduced General W. G. Halpine. Reso. lutions were passed denouncing the treaty in almost every provision. The chief feature of complaint was that no redress had been obtained from England's outrage in imprisoning American Fenians.

The non-Episcopal Methodist Conference, which has just closed its session at Pittsburg, refused by a very decided vote to authorize the ordination of women to the ministry.
