Mr. Fuller—You should put more vegetable matter in it. I do not believe in lime as a fertilizer if applied when there is no vegetable matter; but if there was, then it would do good by decomposing the vegetable.

Mr. Lyman—There are places where caustic lime cannot be obtained for less than 20 cents a bushel, where this gas lime may be had for less than half that price.

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P. T. Quinn—Ever since the sparrows have been introduced we have been worried more than these through the agricultural journals to beware of the ravages of the sparrow. There is no doubt in my mind but that they will feed upon insects when they can get nothing else to eat, but they will also become very destructive and injurious to the fruit-grower in this country.
